These and numerous other technical matters will require the attention of the district attorneys of the counties. It was finally decided that it would be best to wait until the return of Senator Stanford and Mr. Gore from Washington, when the district attorneys can be called together, with representatives from the county courts, and the problems thoroughly discussed with these men who have prohibited and framed the bill, after which counties may take uniform and concerted action.

As a result of the conference the Lane and Douglas county courts have agreed to consider no plans for distributing the funds until the problem is solved.

PALACE OF SWEETS IS SOLD TO NEW ARRIVAL IN CITY

J. O. Harney and Family of Colby, Kans., to Make Home in Roseburg.

Another important business deal which has been under negotiation for the past week, was completed today when J. O. Harney of Colby, Kansas, purchased the Palace of Sweets, one of the most popular confectionery businesses in Roseburg from Mrs. Cora Cloud.

Mr. Harney is another of the large group of tourists who have stopped in Douglas county to make their home, attracted by the many wonderful opportunities and fine climatic conditions. Mr. Harney, together with his wife, son and daughter have been traveling for several months after disposing of a good business in Kansas. They have been seeking a new location and in their search have visited many of the western states. Out of all of the places visited they have selected Roseburg as the best place to live and the most desirable place to invest.

They stopped at the camp grounds more than a week ago and after determining to remain here, Mr. Harney having had many years of experience in the confectionery business, immediately visited the Palace of Sweets and entered into negotiations with Mrs. Cloud for the purchase, taking possession of the business this morning.

Mrs. Cloud, who has been operating the Palace of Sweets for the past two years, has not yet fully decided upon her future business activities.

COLORED LUNATIC SHOTS THREE MEN AND THEN HIMSELF

COUNCIL BLUFFS, Iowa, July 16.—One man was shot to death and two others seriously wounded by a man who became suddenly crazed when the Rock Island train on which he was a passenger, stopped here early today. The negro, believed to be W. M. Johnson of Oklahoma City, then turned his pistol on himself, inflicting a probable fatal wound.

J. P. Anderson, Council Bluffs, switchman, died instantly. A. T. Rohrbach of Rock Island, the conductor, and P. C. Knop of Council Bluffs, Iowa, a passenger, were wounded.

Johnson, who is a taxi and hotel driver of Seattle, Wash., is expected to die momentarily. Both Knop and Rohrbach are expected to recover, but probably after the district attorneys have had time to give official consideration to the problem.

WARMTH OF KLAMATH RIVER SENDS FISH GASPING TO SURFACE

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., July 16.—Hundreds of fish, including suckers, trout, sunfish, carp, catfish and chubs, are floundering on the surface of the Klamath river near Keno, apparently unable to get air, according to citizens of this city who motored to the scene last night.

The river flows without perceptible current for nine miles above Keno and lack of riffles to aerate the water, combined with extreme hot weather of the past few weeks, has lowered the oxygen content of the water. Fish have a point of safety for the fish, observers believe.

Fish escaped from the surface, where they float listlessly, and placed in clear cold water revive in a short time. Shores of the river at Keno are strewn with large trout and suckers.

Winans did not exactly fit the description furnished by Kelso officers and did not resemble a picture sent out, but Kelso sent word to hold him until he is thoroughly examined. The picture is of a young man with Winans is middle aged and heavy.

Kelso officers noticed Multnomah county officers five or six months ago that Hart was understood to be in this vicinity. The other man hunted in the case is John W. Smith.

Winans told the officers that he recently was discharged from the navy after about a month's service and that he had been working in a lumber camp most of the time since.

AIMEE'S STORY OF ABDUCTION BEING GIVEN HARD JOLTS

McPherson, former husband of the evangelist. Investigators tonight declared that the identity of the sender was known and that he would be subpoenaed before the grand jury.

Kidnaping Story Hard Hit.
Three witnesses yesterday confronted Mrs. McPherson in the grand jury room and identified her as the woman they saw in an auto various times and places since her disappearance at Oregon Park.

Mrs. McPherson was called into the grand jury room twice. The first time she stepped inside she was positively identified by O. A. Vick of Culver City and his wife as the woman they saw in an automobile as it passed through Culver City on the afternoon of her disappearance. The couple told the grand jurors the evangelist was traveling in the direction of Los Angeles from Oregon Park. Culver City is midway between the two places. The testimony of Mr. and Mrs. Vick corroborates that of Police Captain M. O. Barnard and Mrs. Barnard of Culver City, who previously told the grand jury of seeing Mrs. McPherson under the same circumstances.

Positive identification of Mrs. McPherson as a woman seen in front of the International Club at Agua Prieta, Sonora, Mexico, shortly before her reappearance, there was made before the grand jury by O. E. Page, automobile man of Tucson, Ariz., under dramatic condition.

Page also was reported to have partially identified H. C. Hallenbeck, confidante of Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, the evangelist's mother, as one of two men who were with Mrs. McPherson at the time.

Wire Awaits Ormiston.
TAYLORSVILLE, N. C., July 16.—A telegram has been in the hands of the Campbell Hotel management here for more than a week addressed to Kenneth G. Ormiston, the manager of the hotel, said today.

J. L. James, in charge of the hotel, said he also understood a telegram had been received today by the Taylorsville police chief in connection with the case. The chief was out of the city and it could not be learned whether his absence was due to an investigation of reports that Ormiston might be in this section.

LOS ANGELES, July 16.—Aimee Semple McPherson's reply to the sworn testimony of five witnesses before the grand jury yesterday that directly contradicted her tale of kidnaping from the Santa Monica beach near here, May 18, last, was the announcement from Angeles Temple, her religious headquarters, today that she had baptized 136 converts at last night's services.

Her mother, Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, made brief but pointed comment on the statements of the men and women who told the grand jury that they had seen Mrs. McPherson in Culver City, a suburb and in Agua Prieta, Mexico, during the time she said she was in the hands of abductors.

"The fires of hell are burning and they must burn themselves out but we are not afraid," said mother Kennedy.

The next session of the grand jury investigation will be held Tuesday when the district attorney's office promises to bring in witnesses to prove that Mrs. McPherson was traveling with Kenneth G. Ormiston, her former radio operator and friend, while her mother was telling the world she was kidnapped and during the time in which the evangelist herself says she was held by kidnappers.

Ormiston, sought throughout the country, is believed to be in North Carolina.

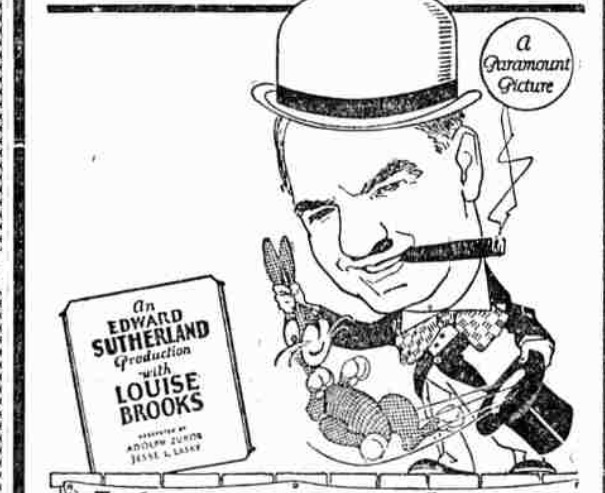
