Traffic Officer Thurston has advised officers throughout the state to pick up the machine and its driver, and it is believed that an arrest will soon be made.

Woman Injured. In a wreck yesterday on Canas Mountain Ruby Madison of Marshfield received painful cuts about the face. She was riding in a car driven by Vincent Colton of Marshfield and occupied also by Mrs. Colton, Johnny Johnson, Jane Howard and Marion Colton. The Ford touring, in which they were on their way home, collided with a Ford coupe driven by Mrs. Edward Wilson of Canas Valley. The impact turned the touring car over, but fortunately none of the occupants were seriously hurt. All received minor bruises, but Mrs. Madison was the most seriously injured, and lost glasses and her face around her eyes. Dr. Shoemaker was called to attend her and the party then went on home.

Fatal Wreck in Klamath. KLAMATH FALLS, July 19.—Victor Andread, local carpenter, was instantly killed last night when a car driven by Ed Erickson, logging contractor, turned over near the city limits. Assistant District Attorney W. A. West, a witness to the accident, ordered Erickson arrested on a charge of reckless driving. An inquest will be held tonight. MEDFORD, Ore., July 19.—Don Robinson, 27, an employee of the local branch of the Portland Flour company, was killed Sunday, when his wife seriously injured, when the automobile he was driving overturned on Buckshot Hill, near here. They were returning to the city from a country dance.

The accident occurred when, in attempting to make a turn in loose gravel, the heavy car overturned, pinning Robinson underneath. His companions on the ill-fated trip were thrown clear, and attempted to lift Robinson from the wreckage, but he could be summoned. Robinson was accompanied by Court Jeschke, who escaped without injury. Miriam Bylesby, who sustained minor bruises, and Mrs. Alberta Robinson, who was badly cut and bruised. Blotworth Explodes. KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., July 19.—James Mitchell, employe of a local baking firm, was seriously burned yesterday in the explosion of a gasoline blower used by him in repainting a car. Skin covering his eyes was burned, but doctors believe damage will not be permanent.

Meacham Retailer. After being denounced by Norris, Meacham's store gave orders that no employe could belong to Norris. He has a right to belong to any other Baptist church, but that they could not be loyal to both Norris and Meacham. According to "The Starlight," two employes quit the church and four quit the service of the department store.

When Chippy came in objecting to this story, Norris said he showed him the door, but that Chippy came back in, making threats against the pastor's life. If the man mentioned Meacham's name in his sermons or weekly, Norris then obtained a night watchman's pistol from a desk drawer and shot Chippy, he said in a statement to the district attorney. Chippy was unarmed. City Detective Bush said after searching the dying man and the office in which he had been shot.

Statement Pursued. TONY QUINN, vice, July 19. R. P. Bonita, chairman of the Board of Trustees of the First Baptist Church and acting as a lawyer for Dr. J. Frank Norris, charged with murder, after slaying D. C. Chippy, said today that he had not authorized a statement charging a "conspiracy" to kill Dr. Norris. WIFE, DAUGHTER, COIN STOLEN FROM MANAGER OF PARK

KANSAS CITY, July 19.—Five bandits early today kidnaped Sam Benjamin, manager of Fairland Park, forced him to open the vault at the park and escaped with \$11,755, representing Saturday and Sunday receipts. Mrs. Benjamin and daughter, Lois, were taken along by the bandits. The Benjamin family was ambushed near their home in the residential district, forced into a car and taken to the park. Two watchmen were bound and gagged. A general roundup of criminals was ordered by police this morning. The Benjamin gave a description of four of the bandits and all agreed that they were Italians between 20 and 30 years old. Mrs. Benjamin wore jewelry valued at \$1800, but it was not taken by the bandits.

Would it surprise you if a woolen mill were established in Sutherland Valley? Since the average drying time in the big Oregon prune districts averages only 20 days before the rains start, the capacity of the drier is a big factor in the size of the dried prune output, the experiment station has pointed out. The fan drier system, known as the "dryer" system, in three ways: circulation of air is increased and maintained; the humidity of the air keeps the skins moist for rapid "sweating" out of moisture; and the humidity gives better conduction of heat.

The value of thinning apples was shown in an Oriley orchard of the Hood River district, in which one lot was thinned to about one apple to four inches, in another to 7 inches and another to 10 inches. The first lot ran 15.2 boxes per tree, the next 12.1, the next 11.6, and the last, the unthinned 13.25. The sales value of the first lot was \$19.12 per tree, of the second \$15.20, the third \$14.54, and the fourth, unthinned, \$14.54.

If orchardists wish to use a sprayer with their spray—milk or casein—it is best to add it when the tank is about three-fourths full of water, as excess foaming occurs, if it is added alone. If lead arsenate is used alone, it may be added at any time, says the O. A. C. experiment station, but since it is so often used with other materials with which it must be added last, the general rule of the station is: "Always add the lead arsenate in the orchard just before starting to spray."

From the standpoint of building up a good band of ewes, retaining ewe lambs has many advantages for Oregon growers over buying yearling ewes, says the animal industry department of the experiment station. This practice is strongly recommended for farm flocks, but many not always be practical on the ranges, where it is often best to get them from the man who can handle enough to make up a straight yearling band.
