FOREST FIRE SITUATION IS IMPROVED TODAY

The forest fire situation in the county was reported greatly improved today. Ranger Frank Rittler of the U. S. forest service, made a flight today in the patrol plane, under instructions from Supervisor Neal, and made a thorough survey of the national forest. No new fires were discovered. One small fire, covering about a quarter of an acre, was found yesterday and extinguished, being located near Drew. All other fires are reported to be under control.

The county patrol reports that it has no new fires today. Nine fires were started yesterday near Dog Butte in the Canaan Valley vicinity. The fires were in a string along the trail and were evidently caused by some careless person passing along the trail smoking.
