BIG GAINS SEEN IN SALE DODGE CARS

Dodge Brothers dealers in United States have delivered 173,373 motor cars and trucks during the first half of 1926, a gain of 52,669 cars or 43.6% over the figures of 120,704 for the first half of 1925.

Although the final figures for Canada for the last week of the second quarter are not yet available, according to the preliminary report the gain in retail deliveries by Dodge Brothers dealers in the Dominion is over 65%.

Total shipments of motor cars and trucks from Dodge Brothers and Graham Brothers factories in the United States and Canada during the first six months of 1926 were 207,117, a gain of 65,315 or 49.2% over the record for the same period last year.

"The official figures for total production of passenger cars and trucks in the United States and Canada during the first six months of 1926 will probably not be available before July 30," said J. O. Newman, "but the industry's gain of 43% over the corresponding period last year reported for the first five months of this year by the United States department of commerce will be little changed. By comparison Dodge Brothers gain is nearly four times as great as that of the industry."
