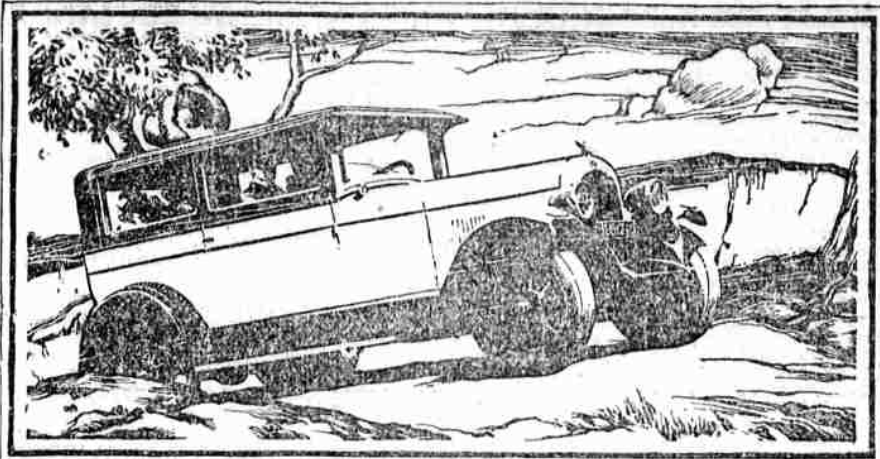


CHEVROLET MOTOR TAKES SEA CAREER

NEW STAR SIX SPORT ROADSTER IS ON EXHIBIT

The new Star Six sport roadster which has been long expected by local auto fans, was received last night at Rapp Brothers garage and placed on exhibit today.

Star performance added another chapter this week, according to the Rapp brothers, when H. C. Haskell and wife, former residents of this city, now of El Paso, Texas, reached Roseburg in a Star roadster. The trip was 1967 miles in length with 800 miles of desert road, then through the Imperial Valley and over the Sierras.

The journey was made in 72 hours of driving time, the average speed being 26.40 miles. The car used 70 gallons of gasoline, an average of 27.14 miles per gallon. Six quarts of oil were required, an average of 32.8 miles per quart. Mr. Haskell was not required to shift out of high gear for any hill encountered upon the entire trip.

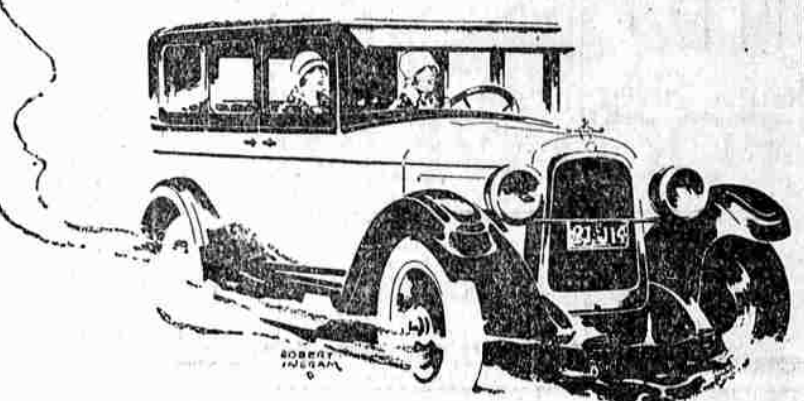

PORTLAND, Ore., July 21.—George Pellias, New Kensington, Penn., coffee house proprietor, held of a suspicious person charge in connection with the slaying of Don R. Mellett, Canton, publisher, was ordered released by Common Pleas Judge James H. McFarlane at a habeas corpus hearing today.
