S. A. T. C. STUDENTS
ARE ENTITLED TO
STATE BONUS LOAN

Officers of Umpqua Post of the American Legion have been advised by the World War Veterans' state aid commission that a recent ruling of the supreme court decided that the portion of the state bonus law providing that "no person shall be entitled to a loan or cash bonus whose only service was in the students' army training corps as a student", to be unconstitutional, and that as a consequence any person with an honorable discharge, who served in the S. A. T. C. between April 6, 1917 and Nov. 11, 1918, can now obtain a state bonus loan.

A person who served in the S. A. T. C. cannot obtain a cash bonus as the last date for filing applications for the cash bonus expired on June 30, 1918, unless such person filed his application in the office of the commission on or before June 30, 1926, in which event he is entitled to either a cash bonus or a loan as he elects.

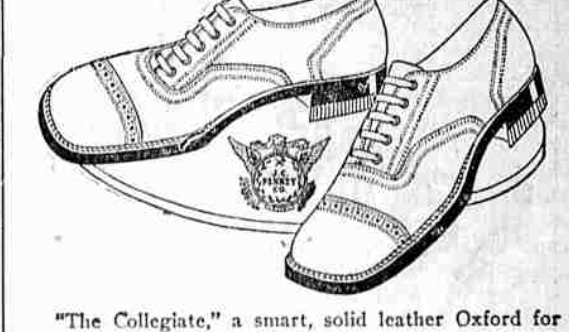

POLICE FORCE

Medford Legionnaires to Offer Plan for Police Patrol Throughout Entire State

According to an official announcement received this morning by the News-Review, Medford post of the American Legion will introduce a resolution on the floor of the American Legion convention at Cape May, N. J., this afternoon, to have the state police force similar to that now in effect in twenty-four of the leading states of the union, believing that in the establishment of this method of policing the state, more efficiency and more economy will be the result. In comparison with the present system of over a hundred of officers and law enforcement.

The following reasons are given in favor of the state police force: Protection of the state at large has permanent force of police, with state wide jurisdiction, is more gradually distributed force than state of police force of the state.
