LIQUOR SERVED ON SHIPPING BOARD'S VESSELS, CHARGED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, July 23.—Charges of liquor selling aboard shipping board vessels, including the Leviathan, preferred by Captain W. H. Stoyan, national chairman of the association against the prohibition amendment, are under investigation by federal authorities in New York. Captain Stoyan declared he had been informed that almost any liquor except beer could be purchased on a recent trip to Europe aboard the Leviathan and that three men were kept busy mixing drinks every night. Stoyan charged that authorities are conniving with bootlegging stewards aboard the vessels. He added that he had been asked to confer with officials in order to have padlock proceedings instituted against the Leviathan, but that the association opposed this as it considered the padlock injunction "one of the most dangerous consequences of the prohibition act." Captain Stoyan of the Leviathan flatly denied the charges.

ROSEBURG RESIDENT DIES AT COAST

Chas. Walter Riggs, of Millers Addition, a well known Roseburg resident, passed away at Marshfield Wednesday evening after an illness lasting since March of this year. With his family Mr. Riggs went to the coast at the first of the week to seek improvement in his health. Nine hours after he had arrived at Marshfield he passed away. The deceased was born in Indiana in 1862 and resided in Springfield, Illinois, and in Nebraska before coming to Roseburg in 1920. Mr. Riggs had been a painter and contractor during his residence here. Surviving are his widow of this city, a daughter, Mrs. W. B. Buck, of Chiloquin, Ore., who were with him at the time of death. Three brothers, Ira of Seattle, Al of Cresco, Nebraska and Frank of Archer, Nebraska, and four grandchildren also survive. The funeral services will be held Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Bible Standard church and will be conducted by Rev. Crook. Burial will take place in the Oakland cemetery.
