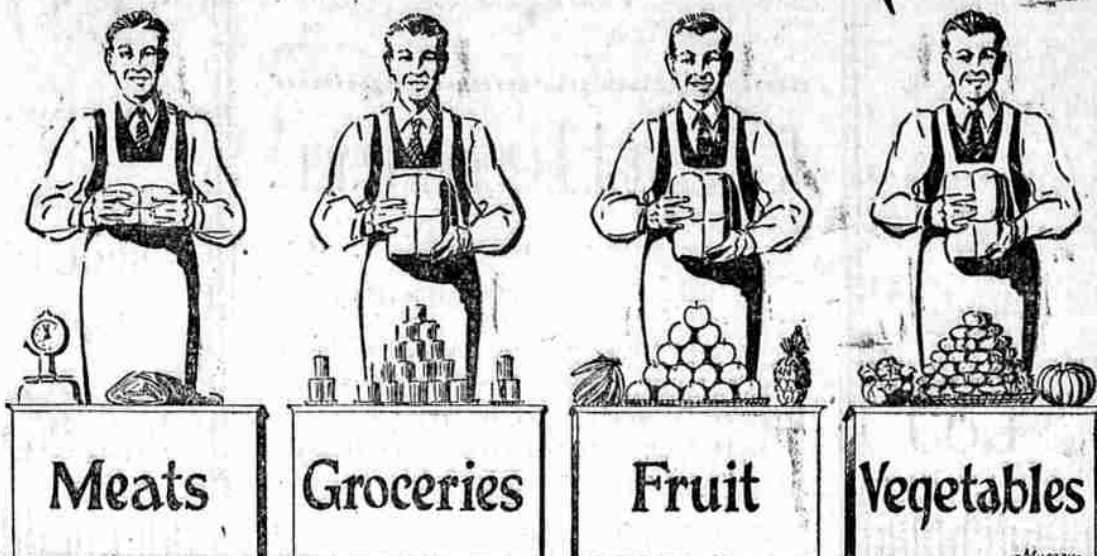

SUBWAY STRIKERS LOSE OUT; APPLY FOR FORMER JOBS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
NEW YORK, July 23.—Three hundred subway motormen and switchmen who went on strike July 6, for higher pay and recognition of their union today were applicants for their old jobs at the old pay.

The strikers came to the conclusion last night that they had lost and voted to march in a body to the offices of the Interborough Rapid Transit company and ask reinstatement. Strike leaders said they would be the last to apply.

The strikers had demanded a 20 per cent increase of pay, motormen seeking \$1 an hour. The company refused to arbitrate with the strikers, who had formed a union in revolt from the company union. The company claimed a five cent fare would not permit wage increase.

Reduced service was maintained throughout the strike and was gradually increased. There were

no disorders and no serious accidents. A large portion of the 2,000,000 persons who use the subway daily resorted to the elevated also owned by the I. R. T. buses and other transportation.

EDWIN P. COCHRAN DIES.

SALEM, Ore., July 23.—Edwin P. Cochran, father of John W. Cochran, deputy internal revenue collector, died at his home here yesterday at the age of 80 years.

Mr. Cochran was born at Ripley, N. Y., in September, 1846, and came to Oregon in 1886, living in Salem since that time. For a number of years he was employed at the state hospital for the insane.

Mr. Cochran leaves three children, John W. Cochran of Portland, Mrs. George T. Pratt of Oregon and H. G. Cochran of Salem. He also leaves a sister, Miss S. Roseanna Cochran, of Pacific Grove, Calif., and a brother, John G. Cochran, of Santa Rosa, Cal.
