FUNERAL OF R. A. HOLLIS HELD THIS AFTERNOON

The funeral services of the late
Rufus A. Hollis, of Myrtle Creek,
who passed away in this city yes-
terday, were held this afternoon at

taking parlors. Rev. Joseph Knotts
officiating. The body will be ship-
ped to Wichita Falls, Texas, for
burial.

Mr. Hollis had been a resident

of Myrtle Creek for the past year,
coming from Huntington Beach,
Calif. He was born in Alabama
and was 47 years of age at the
time of death. He had been in
Roseburg for the past two weeks
and had been removed from Myrtle
hospital, where he had been re-
ceiving treatment, to a home on
Pine street where his death oc-
curred. His widow and five chil-
dren, all of Myrtle Creek, and one
brother, residing in Oklahoma,
survive.
