

COOPERATIVE WOOL ASSOCIATION IS IN FINE CONDITION

Reports of Directors at San Francisco Meeting Very Encouraging, Beckley Says.

Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Beckley, who have been spending the past few days in San Francisco, where they attended a meeting of the Pacific Cooperative Wool Growers Association, of which Mr. Beckley is president, have returned to their home near this city. Mr. Beckley was one of the organizers of the wool association, which has made a fine record during the few years of its existence, and which now embraces all of the states of the Pacific coast. Mr. Beckley has served as president for two terms, directing the business affairs of the organization into very successful channels.

The purpose of the meeting, according to Mr. Beckley, was to bring the operations of the association, whose head office is located in Portland, closer home to the members who reside in the states of California and Nevada. The quarterly meeting of the board of directors was held on the 22nd and 23rd at the association, warehouse in San Francisco, the meeting being open to all members and well attended by representative growers from California, Oregon and Nevada.

"As many of the prominent wool growers of Douglas county are included in the membership of the association, it is a matter of local interest that sales of mohair and wool from western Oregon were reported made at favorable prices," Mr. Beckley stated today upon his return from the meeting. "It is believed the mohair pool can be closed in the near future at prices substantially higher than those paid on the open market earlier in the season."

"At the recent meeting, the organization, operating in five Pacific coast states, was found, after careful consideration of reports, to be progressing in a manner satisfactory to all."

"Statements made by visiting members were very encouraging to the association officers, it being the expressed opinion of those present at the meeting that the work of the organization, in putting their products on the market year after year, was doing much to improve their financial condition and stabilize the market for these products. It was brought out by these members that the cooperative work of the association has materially advanced the prices paid to farmers throughout the territory in which it operates, and all members were urged to stand by the association, as in their opinion it is one of the farmers' organizations entitled to the support of all producers."

MAN ARRESTED IN EAST CLAIMS PAL MURDERED DOVEY

KELSO, Wash., July 26.—Thomson Dovey, Kelso editor, murdered June 19, 1925, was killed in a suit case with Frank T. Hart, ex-convict, who had been prevented from staging a boxing match in Kelso, according to a statement made at St. Louis Saturday to Clark Studebaker, former Cowlitz county sheriff, by John Owen, alias John W. Smith, Hart's partner in promoting the boxing match.

Owen faces a first degree murder charge, following his arrest at St. Louis last Saturday.

Details of Owen's statement relate that the fight was to have been held June 20, but the bout was called off June 19 following bitter opposition on the part of Dovey, Kelso clergymen and others.

A few days previous, Owen said, he had secured a gun from a friend. "I was at the hotel when Hart came in," Owen said. "He said he had just bumped Dovey off and that he would have to beat it. He stole an automobile and he went to Laramie, Wyo. On the way he told me he had gone to see Dovey and that he was going to knock him down the street arguing about the prizefight when they started to fight. Hart said he knocked Dovey very down and hit him over the head with the butt of the pistol and as he did so it accidentally went off."

Hart has not been apprehended. Owen, in custody of officers left St. Louis for Kelso Saturday.

COOLIDGE FAVORS DEBT PAYMENTS BY MEANS OF TRADE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
PAUL SMITHS, N. Y., July 26.—A statement denying that President Coolidge had made any assertion about foreign debts or postponed trade agreements in connection with such debts, as reported in the Syracuse Herald yesterday, was issued at the executive offices today.

"The president has made no statement," the announcement said, "and authorized no interview concerning our foreign debts or trade agreement. Any claim to the contrary is without foundation. He did remark to a social visitor that foreign debtors could pay their debts in part from foreign trade. He has not mentioned trade agreements."

The interview by a staff correspondent indicated that the president now regarded the trade agreements as the logical recourse for an adjustment of certain war time debts.

It has been consistently said at the executive office since the present political situation developed in France that Mr. Coolidge could not comment on that subject, because it concerned the affairs of another country.

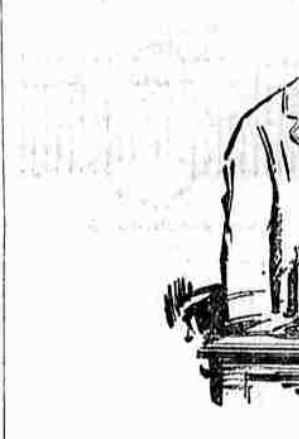
Comic complications pile up with increasing rapidity and take an unexpected turn when MacLean gives the girl's father what he thinks is a headache powder but which turns out to be poison.
