REEDSPORT TO HAVE NEW BUILDING AND LOAN ASSOCIATION

REEDSPORT, July 26.—One of the biggest booster moves ever taken in Reedport was consummated Monday noon when over a score of business and professional men took steps to organize a community building association in the city.

The move was one of the best taken here during the past few years was shown when approximately \$12,000 was subscribed within a few minutes after the plan was explained.

Temporary officers were named and instruction given for securing articles of incorporation of the association, capitalized at \$20,000. C. McC. Johnson, Warren P. Reed, and W. A. Lovelace were named as temporary directors.

The business and professional men are to meet again Monday noon to continue the organization of the association. Plans will be discussed at that time to start actual building operations upon a unit of twenty houses.

KITCHEN CUPBOARD

A Few Sandwiches

FOR the afternoon tea there is no daintier or more welcome as a tasty sandwich. They may be prepared and ready long before service.

The following hot sandwich is one quickly prepared and very attractive:

Five o'clock Tea Sandwich.—Work a cream cheese with a wooden spoon until smooth enough to spread. Season with salt and pepper. Spread this mixture evenly with the cheese then cover with small shreds of lettuce, sliced to fit the crackers. Cover with another cracker and place in moderate oven until the cheese and lettuce melt. Serve hot.

California Sandwiches.—Cut sandwich bread into one-fourth-inch slices. Spread three slices thickly with mayonnaise on both sides; spread two slices on but one side.

Put mild green peppers through the meat chopper twice, put mild red peppers through the meat chopper twice, keep separate. Squeeze dry in a cloth to remove moisture, season with grated onion and molasses with mayonnaise. Put between slices of bread. There should be two layers of green peppers and one of red. Trim off the crusts and fold in a napkin; place under a weight. After several hours cut into one-fourth-inch slices for serving.

Jewish Cheese Sandwiches.—Mix one-fourth of a cupful of sweet butter with one large-sized egg, cream cheese, add one teaspoonful of chopped capers, one shallot chopped fine, one-half teaspoonful of caraway seed, mix thoroughly and pack solidly into a small brick mold. Let stand in the refrigerator over night to ripen. Remove from the mold, cut into thin slices and put between buttered rye bread spread thickly with French mustard. Pressed together, trim and serve with coffee.

Green Sandwiches.—Chop green pepper, Bermuda onion and a sprig of two of parsley, mix all together in proportions to suit the taste, add big mayonnaise or cooked solid dressing. The vegetables will need to be squeezed from their juices, then add the solid dressing. Serve on buttered white bread.

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BORAH'S CHARGES BRING INVITATION FROM CHURCHILL

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

LONDON, July 26.—Winston Churchill, chancellor of the exchequer, shown Senator Borah's statement that he was conducting a "campaign of vilification" against the United States, designed to secure cancellation of the war debts, is quoted by the Exchange Telegraph as saying:

"I invite the senator to quote any passage from any speech or written statement of mine on which he relies to justify such a complaint."

Senator Borah, chairman of the senate foreign relations committee, in a formal statement Saturday charged that Chancellor Churchill had sought by recent utterances in parliament to apply military tactics to the international situation and conduct "a full-scale campaign for cancellation."

Vilification has always been a part of military strategy the senator said and now it had been brought into play to brand the United States as "Uncle Snylock" and the American people as a nation "void of all sense of humanity or correct principles."

CLOSE CULLING WAY TO BUILD UP WOOL FLEECES

Gains of 1.47 pounds. In average

fleeces sheared from a band of 1920 to 1925 Rambouillet ewes were made in four years' culling out of light shearers, on the Nod Shorlock ranch near Lakeview. The first year's record, 1922, was 3.3 pounds for 1545 ewes, only 180 going above 10 pounds. The average of 1924 ewes in 1925 was 9.7 pounds 744 going above 10 pounds.

In this plan of building bigger fleeces sheepmen and county agents of southern and eastern Oregon are cooperating with H. A. Lindgren of the college extension service. Incentive for the project came from results obtained by Oliver Brothers of Grant county, who 11 years ago started culling a band of 3500 Delaine ewes averaging 8 pounds of wool. The first year they culled out all ewes falling short of 8 pounds—300 in all. The remainder were mated with purebred rams averaging 25 pounds fleeces. Systematic culling followed and this year 50 ewes selected at random sheared an average of 13 pounds. At the same time the lamb crop of the flock was 135 per cent.

The Shorlock flock is handled as on well managed sheep ranches, says Mr. Lindgren—wintered and lambled in sheds on the ranch and summered on the range. The fleeces are weighed just as they are in the fleece tier. Each ewe as shorn is held in a separate compartment until her fleece weight is recorded. Low producers are marked for culling in the fall, to be replaced in the breeding flock with yearlings from the band.

Culling is based on fleece weight, condition, conformation, age and ability to produce lambs. During the four years that the flock was checked, the lamb crop was ranged from 95 to 100 per cent at weaning time.

The work of building up fleece weights on the Shorlock ranch has attracted wide attention. While shearing was in progress this spring about 50 Lake county sheepmen visited the ranch to gain first hand information on the why and how of culling. The agricultural extension service of Nevada sent up a representative from Reno to make notes on the proceedings as a basis for similar work.

SEVENTY-THREE NEW SETTLERS CHOSE OREGON

Seventy-three new arrivals from the east and middle west selected farm homes in Oregon during the month of June, scattering throughout the various sections of the state, according to the records of the land settlement department of the state and Portland chambers of commerce.

That Oregon gained economically by this influx of farmers and their families is evidenced by the fact that they made capital investments of over \$243,300.

In addition the department has been visited by 69 families who have been in correspondence and have arrived to make a selection of a farm in Oregon.

During the month of June the land settlement department was in communication with 81 people who announced that they would come to this state to locate. These people have furnished confidential information showing that they have capital to invest amounting to more than \$100,000.

Personal letters answering specifically individual questions are sent to all inquiries by W. G. Ide, manager of the state chamber, and during June 2,286 of these letters were mailed from the office. Accompanying letters to prospective homeseekers were 4,379 pieces of illustrated literature containing facts relative to all sections of Oregon. In this way placing of settlers on arrival is expedited as they usually are able to determine before hand the portion of the state which appeals to them most and they are immediately ready to confer with the local realtors and land settlement committees concerning the choice of a farm in that locality.
