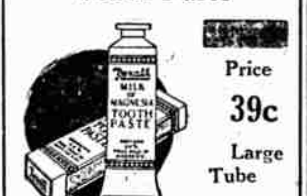

FIRE DEPARTMENT HISTORY TOLD TO KIWANIS CLUB

The Kiwanis club was entertained today by an interesting talk given by Fire Chief James Fletcher who in a brief manner gave a historical account of the establishing, development and improvement of the Roseburg fire department. Mr. Fletcher, who has been engaged in fire prevention and suppression work in Roseburg for many years, gave a history dealing with the fire department in its first organization, showing the progress made not only in equipment but in methods.

He gave statistics showing the value of good equipment in reducing losses through ability to quickly reach a fire.

Following his talk, which proved not only interesting but instructive as well, the Kiwanians ordered the adoption of a resolution expressing appreciation for the work the fire department of Roseburg is doing.

District Attorney Guy Cordon spoke on the matter of the inclusion of Diamond Lake in Crater Lake national park, showing why such a change is not desirable. The club instructed the adoption of a resolution protesting against removing the administration of the lake from the forest service.

The attendance prize was given by Edward Kohlhaugen and was won by Glenn McAllister.

ALLOYS IN STEEL MAKE IT USEFUL FOR PRESENT AGE

Nobody knows who first discovered steel—it was used before the time of recorded history. Soft iron was produced in the British Isles for thirteen hundred years beginning about 55 B. C. The Germans by adding carbon to their iron produced cast iron. This was the beginning of steel making.

Shortly after the Civil war Bessemer made the first cheap steel by a process that bears his name. Then, in 1875, Carnegie opened his first plant. Since that time the production of steel has grown to the point where it ranks as one of the big four in the industrial field. Alloys are used to adapt iron and steel to the various uses to which it is put.

Chromium and vanadium rank first among the important alloys. Metallic chromium combined with steel makes it hard and tough. It enters into the manufacture of safes, cutlery and rifle barrels.

Vanadium gives to steel its ability to withstand extremely heavy shocks. It comes from Peru. Chromium and vanadium are the most difficult and expensive alloys to obtain.

"Some of our competitors use chrome vanadium and other alloy steels quite freely," said J. O. Newland, local dealer, "but as we are able to ascertain, none use as high a percentage as Dodge Brothers. It is an endless task to keep track of each company as they change too frequently."

ELK CITY LUMBER PLANT IS BURNED

NEWPORT, Ore., July 27.—The business section of Elk City was threatened with destruction late yesterday, when the plant of the Pioneer Lumber Company, operated by N. G. Harris, was destroyed by fire which started in the engine room, spread to the yards, which were partially burned, and to the approach of the Elk River bridge. The fire caused a loss of \$7,000, with no insurance.

Combined efforts of the Newport Fire Department, which made a 25-mile run to the scene, and the Pacific Spruce Chemical equipment from Toledo, prevented the flames from spreading to nearby frame structures. Hundreds of motorists aided in the fight. The destruction of the span approach temporarily cuts off Elk City from the Newport Corvallis highway.

DUMMIES FIXED BY BOYS ENABLE THEM TO ESCAPE

MEDFORD, Ore., July 27.—James Courtland and Harry Douglas, both 15 years of age, and homeless, alleged by the authorities to have been deserted by their parents, and held in the county jail at Jacksonville, pending their transfer to the state industrial school at Salem, escaped last night. They were alleged to have stolen watermelons.

The pair were held in the women's ward, and allowed considerable freedom. When the jailer went to lock them up for the night they hid downstairs. There were dummy figures in the boys' beds, deceiving the turnkey.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) PORTLAND, Ore., July 27.—Stiff advances are shown in local butter and egg prices with the market very strong at the higher levels. Light receipts during the last few days together with a higher trend in other coast markets is responsible for the advances here.

On the dairy exchange cube butter was boosted 1½¢ in all grades but firsts while the lower grade advanced a cent. Quotations now are: Extras 32½¢; standards 32½¢; prime firsts 37½¢; and firsts 35½¢.

Fresh eggs also show a brisk advance for the day with current receipts up 2¢ to 2½¢ net and all other grades a cent higher. Fresh standard extras now quoted at 32¢ with firsts at 31¢ and mediums at 27¢.
