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LIGHTNING IS CAUSE OF MANY FOREST FIRES

"This is the worst period ever experienced in the national forests of the Northwest," is the statement of the Portland forest service of forest, referring to the period from July 10 to 20 this year. Over 81 per cent of the forest fires during this period have been caused by lightning.

On the twenty-two national forests of the North Pacific district 397 fires have been reported during this ten-day period. Three hundred twenty were caused by dry electrical storms. For the entire season to date, a total of 811 fires have been reported of which 484 or 59 per cent, were caused by lightning. Smokers fires still are high, occupying second place in causes with 101 for the season, with camp fires third with 98. Man-caused fires total 339 for the season, or 41 per cent.

The situation throughout these two states is still critical and all forest agencies are urging smokers, campers and fishermen to remember this when they are in the forests, and to be absolutely sure that every spark is out, from match, cigarette and campfire.

With lightning the main cause for the last ten-day period, fires have been concentrated in northern Washington, on the Colville, Chelan and Mount Baker national forests; although three Oregon forests likewise suffered, the Ochoco, Umpqua and Fremont. The Umpqua had 53 fires, one dry electrical storm. The Colville and Chelan forests have suffered most during the period.

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PORTLAND TRUCK DRIVER KILLED AT RAILWAY CROSSING

PORTLAND, Ore., July 26.—Roy Adams, employee of a fuel company, was perhaps fatally hurt today when he was hit by a Northern Pacific passenger train as he drove a team of horses on a track at a grade crossing. He was thrown into the air. One horse was killed and the other cut and bruised.
