PERJURY IS NEW PROBE ANGLE IN M'PHERSON CASE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) LOS ANGELES, July 28.—Evidence will be presented to the county grand jury to determine whether perjury has been committed in connection with the grand jury investigation into the story of Almee Semple McPherson, evangelist, that she was kidnaped. District Attorney Asa Keyes announced here today.

"In view of the new evidence obtained on the investigation of the charge of kidnaping of Mrs. Almee Semple McPherson, I consider it my duty as district attorney of this county to present evidence to the grand jury to determine whether perjury has been committed," the formal statement issued by the district attorney said. The announcement followed a conference of several hours with Deputy District Attorney Joseph Ryan and Chief of Detectives Herman Cline, who returned to Los Angeles from Carmel, Calif., where they conducted an investigation in connection with the case.

Mrs. Kennedy, mother of Mrs. McPherson, when subpoenaed at Angelus Temple of the statement by the district attorney, announced that at present there was no statement to make, but that one may be issued from Angelus Temple later.

Witnesses from Monterey and Carmel will be called before the grand jury here next Tuesday, it was announced at the district attorney's office.
