FIRE ON SOUTH MYRTLE CREEK MAKING GAINS

Firefighters Called From Grants Pass to Aid in Giant Task.

MILL IS THREATENED

Over One Hundred Men Engaged in Battle Against Flames on Fifteen Mile Front.

With fire burning over approximately 2,500 acres in the South Myrtle Creek district, threatening farm homes, sawmill, and valuable timber, the situation in that vicinity today is serious. The fire covers portions of ten or twelve sections and is in a circle of more than fifteen miles circumference. This large front approximately five miles have been reached, leaving about ten miles of fire front not yet controlled.

The fire is burning in a rough triangle, one leg extending from the head of Lewis Creek, back along the headwaters of Craig, Lehigh, Weaver and Latta creeks, to the shoulder of Duck Butte. The base of the triangle is on Lewis and Sibley creeks, and the south line parallels the road up South Myrtle creek, extending from the Jefferson Wiley place back to the point of Duck Butte.

Along the south side the fire threatens many farm homes and the Zeigler sawmill located on Lehigh or "Fish" creek.

Over 100 men are engaged in fighting this fire and have constructed nearly five miles of trench along one side, preventing further spread in that direction.

Grants Pass Sends Men

All available men in the south end of the county have been furnished employment, and in the immediate vicinity of the fire the residents have been impressed in service. Superintendent Brown last night enlisted the aid of the Josephine county organization in securing more fire fighters and twenty men were sent in from Grants Pass this morning. Ten of these were stationed at the Zeigler mill in an effort to save that plant from destruction. The mill is a valuable plant and the patrol is making an effort to save the mill and the surrounding timber.

On the North Myrtle Creek side, the situation was reported considerably improved today. The fire fighters have gained control, it is believed, further spread having been halted last night.

On the South Myrtle side, however, the flames are still traveling rapidly, while the high humidity is making itself evident by the manner in which the flames travel. Last night the fire burned over a distance of nearly a mile and a half in an hour's time, making a most spectacular scene.

Forest service and fire patrol officials have been working day and night in the effort to control the fire, the high humidity resulting in many difficult problems.

GIRL VICTIM OF FIEND; ESCORT TO DANCE SUSPECTED

STOCKTON, Calif., July 29.—Nina Breakley, 16, was found dead today in the yard of a residence. The condition of her body when found by police officers indicated that she had been attacked. George Pound is held by the police.

Pound, who at first claimed to have left both Nina Breakley and Rose Ford at the home of the latter after taking them home from a dance last night, later altered his statement and admitted to detectives that he drove Nina Breakley about ten miles out on the Linden road and tried to assault her.

Miss Breakley, Pound said, struggled and in the fight, he was struck on the head and lost consciousness. She apparently hurt herself. Pound continued and he put her in the car and returned to Stockton. He claimed he was too drunk at the time to remember where or how Miss Breakley finally left his car.

The girl's clothing was torn and disarranged. Bruises on the body indicated that she had put up a desperate struggle against her assailant. Pound is a mechanic, about 23 years old.

Lovers At Wed At Salem In 67th Year

SALEM, Ore., July 30.—A romance commenced half a century ago, came to a culmination today when G. W. Philbrick, 67, of Silverton, this county, and Mrs. E. M. Bradley, also 67, of Alameda, Calif., were married by County Judge J. T. Hunt at the court house.

They met 49 years ago in Vermont state, when each was 18 years old. After "keeping company" for three years they became engaged. Philbrick believed that he should be amply able to take care of his bride when he married, so he bade his fiancée goodbye and started out west to make his "stake."

The girl waited, but no word came back. After due time she gave him up for lost, she told Judge Hunt today, and married and raised a family. The years passed and no word passed between the two.

Last fall, Philbrick told the judge he began thinking of the sweetheart of his young days and the old longings urged him to start inquiries for her. He finally located her at Alameda, a widow. He went to visit her.

This morning Mrs. Bradley arrived and in half an hour after the train came in they were married. They will make their home near Silverton.

"It's better late than never," they both chimed in, after the ceremony was performed.

When the couple told their story to the judge they failed to say whether Philbrick had been married before, or whether he remained single in memory of his first and only love.

STATE REFUSES TO ADD UMPQUA ROAD TO ITS SYSTEM

Adoption Expected in Distant Future But No Action for Present—Survey Discussed.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

PORTLAND, Ore., July 30.—The State Highway Commission yesterday was unable to accede to a request of a Douglas county delegation that the commission take over the Umpqua road and make it a state highway. The commission, however, agreed to a request by the delegation that a survey be made from Scottsburg to Drain, 33 miles, provided the county and the Umpqua district pay the expenses.

Harley C. Johnson, of Roseburg, was awarded the contract for surfacing ten miles of the Missouri Bend section of the Alsea road in Benton county for \$17,330.

The request for the state to light the Rogue River bridge on the Pacific Highway was declined. A formal request of the state game commission to have inserted a clause in all contracts for road and bridge work let by the commission that the contractors shall see that all employees obey the state game laws was not acted upon.

The meeting of the county delegation with the state highway commission had one good result, that of obtaining a thorough understanding concerning the status of the Umpqua highway, according to District Attorney Guy Gordon, who returned this morning from Portland, where he appeared before the commission as spokesman for the delegation. The state looks upon the Umpqua highway as a road that will eventually be included in the state system, but that time is far in the future, according to the intimations received.

"The Umpqua highway improvement district was formed for the purpose of building the Drain-Scottsburg section of the Umpqua highway, according to state specifications," Mr. Gordon explained. "It was the mutual understanding between the leaders in the improvement district that these two projects were to be carried out simultaneously."

A large delegation appeared before the county court a few days ago and urged the court to ask the highway commission to advance the funds necessary to complete the section of the Umpqua highway between Redport and Log, completing the Drain-Scottsburg section of the Umpqua highway, according to state specifications. Mr. Gordon explained.

"It was the mutual understanding between the leaders in the improvement district that these two projects were to be carried out simultaneously."

"The county court adopted a resolution to this effect, and this was presented to the commission with the request that the commission understand for simultaneous work be carried out by a state survey of the Umpqua road."

"The commission states that it could not put the Umpqua road on the state map at this time, nor (Continued on page 6.)

CATHOLICS OF MEXICO OFFER FINAL PRAYERS

Priests to Withdraw From Churches Tomorrow as Act of Protest.

NONE ALLOWED ARMS

Modification of New Law to Be Sought Through Boycott—Arrests Have Begun.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

MEXICO CITY, July 30.—Catholics throughout Mexico today offered up devotions for the last time under the leadership of their priests before the government's new religious regulations go into effect tomorrow.

Under regulations from Archbishop Mora y del Rio, priests will withdraw from the churches tomorrow in protest against the government's religious measures. The withdrawal was originally planned for Sunday.

President Calles in a speech last night declared that the hour was approaching for a final fight to determine the triumph of revolution or reaction. The struggle was between light and darkness, and the government would win, he said.

To Catholics in the country are to be disarmed in accordance with an order issued by Attorney General Ortega. Senior Ortega said this move was a consequence of reports that Catholics were meeting secretly at night and that the authorities were fearful the gatherings were for the purpose of offering opposition to the religious laws.

When the priests withdraw they will turn over the churches to lay committees. The government announced that it will not permit lay committees to take over the churches and has ordered the mayor of each town to name his own committee for that purpose. The priests' committee, however, will endeavor to reach a compromise on the personnel of each committee. A report from Vera Cruz says the mayors have been instructed to use federal troops if necessary to preserve order, when the mayors' committee take over the churches.

Church authorities have instructed all Catholics to continue attending church, and to pray for a satisfactory settlement of the situation.

The new regulations provide that only clergy of Mexican citizenship may officiate at religious services; that all church property shall be confiscated on the ground that it has been held by churches unlawfully for fifty years. Religious instruction in school is prohibited. Secularist publications are forbidden to comment on or carry news on national political affairs.

The National League for Defense of Religious Liberty will start an "economic boycott" of protest tomorrow.

The league contemplates that all Catholics and persons opposed to the government's present religious policy as well, shall cease spending money for anything except absolute necessities. The league hopes by the boycott to effect an economic slump which will be sufficiently embarrassing to the government to cause it to modify its policy.

Three successive acts of directors of the league have been arrested, charged with inciting the people to acts of disorder.

OREGON MILITIAMAN TO RECEIVE DOUBLE AWARD

SALEM, Ore., July 30.—Adjutant General George A. White has received instructions from the secretary of war that an army rifle team badge be issued to Second Lieutenant Robert Benjamin Smith, 1231 East 16th street, Portland, on account of his winning a place as principal on the Oregon National Guard team in the national rifle match of 1925. It is also ordered that a distinguished marksman's badge be awarded him for his work in the 1925 match.

Since then he has been with me every day, and I have attained that happiness which nothing can destroy. I want you to share this joy, for then you will know that all paths lead to him."

Finger Print Phase of McPherson Case Proves Valueless; "New and Startling" Evidence Announced

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

LOS ANGELES, July 30.—Finger print experts of the police department announced today that finger marks obtained in a cottage at Carmel so far examined, could not be identified as those of Almeda Semple McPherson owing to their blurred condition.

District Attorney Asa Keyes said today the demand of Mrs. McPherson for a "show down" would be met in the form of the presentation of "new and startling evidence" before the grand jury which convenes next Tuesday.

Also, the grand jury will be asked to consider whether any of the witnesses at the previous sessions including the Los Angeles pastor were guilty of perjury.

Officials here are skeptical of Mrs. McPherson's story of her alleged kidnapping and have been looking into reports that for part of the time at least the pastor may have been in Carmel, an act contrary to Monterey, with Kenneth G. Ormiston, former radio operator at the temple. It was learned late last night that "startling new evidence" has been revealed which puts Mrs. McPherson in Los Angeles on June 19, four days before she reappeared in Agua Prieta. All this, it is declared at Angelus Temple, is but a part of a plot to "get" the evangelist. Foreman W. H. Carter of the jury says there must be no "beating about the bush" and that the jury must get at the bottom of the case.

To aid in this District Attorney Keyes has sent two representatives to Carmel. One is to serve subpoenas on a number of persons who say they are sure they can identify a couple that lived at a cottage there under the name of Mr. and Mrs. George McIntyre for ten days during Mrs. McPherson's absence as Kenneth G. Ormiston and Mrs. McPherson.

The Times says that Superior Judge Carlos Hardy last night announced he had been instrumental in the employment by Almeda Semple McPherson of a nationally known detective agency to conduct an exhaustive inquiry in an effort to uncover evidence to substantiate the evangelist's kidnapping story. Judge Hardy explained that he acted in the capacity of friend and adviser of Mrs. McPherson and that the new investigation is to be made independent of the one being conducted by the constituted authorities.

New Evidence Found. LOS ANGELES, July 30.—Deputy District Attorney Joe Ryan, in charge of assembling evidence for the second presentation of the Almeda Semple McPherson case to the grand jury next week, announced today that he had obtained the sworn affidavit of an unnamed man asserting that Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, mother of Mrs. McPherson, had asked him over the telephone to bring an automobile by night to the Mexican border during the time it was said that Mrs. McPherson had been drowned and prior to her reappearance at Douglas, Ariz., June 23.

The man, according to Ryan's announcement, said that he recognized Mrs. Kennedy's voice, having heard it a number of times over the radio and at the time, he said, he commented on the fact to his wife and daughter.

The unidentified deponent, Ryan said, did not accept the border night-driving commission. He fixed the date as the 18th or 19th of June.

Roland R. Woolley, attorney for Mrs. McPherson, returned from Carmel today and issued the statement that he believed "Ormiston was implicated in the kidnapping."

Woolley would not say if he had obtained any evidence to disprove the theory that Kenneth Ormiston, former radio operator at Angelus Temple, McPherson headquarters here, had spent several days in a Carmel cottage with a woman resembling Mrs. McPherson while search was being made for the supposedly drowned body of the evangelist at Santa Monica Beach.

CONTRIBUTORS TO FUND FOR SMITH PETEET CASE ARE HELD NOT GUILTY

CHICAGO, July 30.—Allen E. Moore, campaign manager for Frank L. Smith, successful candidate in the Illinois senatorial primary, decided today to furnish the senate campaign funds committee names of all contributors to the Smith political fund.

Moore disclosed that Clement Studebaker of South Bend, Ind., had contributed \$29,000 and former Representative Ira C. Copely of Aurora, Ill., had given \$25,000 in two installments.

Other contributors included Dan Schuyler, Chicago attorney \$2,500; Eugene Pike \$1,000; Judge Stransky of Chicago \$500; and Nick Kachavos, on behalf of Greek merchants of Chicago, \$1,000.

The Illinois Republican national committee man said he knew nothing of the report that Smith managers had offered Charles Seely of East St. Louis, president of the Illinois foreign voters' league \$8,000 for the support of that organization.

"In going through my files, I came across an unanswered letter from Seely under date of July 22, of this year, asking for a conference with me," Moore said. "My secretary received it and threw it in a basket."

The witness added that if the matter had come to his attention he would have told Seely that Smith already had the support of the foreign voters and did not need his assistance.

The committee adjourned the hearing until next Tuesday to enable Senator Reed to fill week-end engagements in Missouri and Senator LaFollette to fill such engagements in Wisconsin.

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RELEASE FROM JAIL IS ASKED BY MRS. HALL

Widow of Slain Minister, Worth \$1,700,000, Has Three Attorneys.

NEW WITNESS FOUND

Factory Worker Held Under Bail and Search Again Starts for Former Investigator.

SOMERVILLE, N. J., July 30.—On the ground that there was "no great evidence or presumption of guilt," pointing to her as the murderer of her clergyman husband and his alleged sweetheart, Mrs. Frances H. Hall was ordered released in \$15,000 bail by Chief Justice Gummere today.

SOMERVILLE, N. J., July 30.—Application for the release of Mrs. Frances H. Hall, held in jail here for the double murder four years ago of her clergyman husband and Mrs. Eleanor Mills, a singer in his choir, was made today.

Hearing of the application will be made this afternoon before Chief Justice Gummere at Point Pleasant.

William Phillips, factory worker, has joined Mrs. Hall in the county jail. He was arrested last night as a material witness and held in \$5,000 bail. He informed investigators four years ago that he had seen Mrs. Hall and her brother return home on the night of the slayings.

Mrs. Louise Riehl, formerly maid in the Hall home, denies assertions of her husband that she was paid \$5,000 for secrecy. She is quiet, however, as revealing that Bertha Tough, another maid in the Hall home, was off duty on the night of the murder, saw the Rev. Mr. Hall and Mrs. Mills at their trying place in an abandoned orchard, and telephoned to Mrs. Hall. Mrs. Hall is said to have left her home afterward in company with her brother, Willie Stearns, and her chauffeur, Peter Tumulty.

Mrs. Hall has 3 lawyers.

Although Mrs. Hall insists that her arrest was ridiculous, she makes the best of her situation. She has a room with barred windows on the second floor of the jail. Her meals are sent and she spends considerable time in conference with her three lawyers. She is 49 years old and reputed to be worth \$1,750,000.

It was learned at Trenton, N. J., today that a warrant is out for the arrest of the former State Trooper Henry Dickman, long held in custody assigned to continue the Hall Mills probe after all other troopers had been recalled from the case in October, 1922.

Dickman is wanted on a had check charge involving a Jersey City bank, and on suspicion that he has knowledge of who killed the Rev. Dr. Edward W. Hall and Mrs. Eleanor R. Mills. The search that has been going on for him since he disappeared in June, 1923, is now under way with fresh vigor.

REPUBLICAN LEADERS SEE COOLIDGE AGAIN IN 1928

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

PAUL, SMITHS, N. Y., July 30.—In a talk with newspaper men the former ambassador, Richard Washburn Child, who was a guest at the camp today, said the country seemed to be generally assuming that Mr. Coolidge would be a successful candidate in 1928. Mr. Child asserted that in his opinion, the President was responsible for the government's economic program and also for preventing Washington from becoming a center of bureaucracy. He characterized Mr. Coolidge as a conservative Republican, whose belief in a decentralized government was even stronger than that of an old time Jeffersonian Democrat.

The President received an informal call at the office yesterday from Representative Snell of Portland, N. Y., chairman of the house rules committee and a prominent Republican leader. Discussing political conditions with newspaper men Mr. Snell said the country in general was very favorable toward Mr. Coolidge and that northern New York, a Republican stronghold, was stronger than ever for him.

King Boris To Marry Italian Princess of 19

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

LONDON, July 30.—Reuter's Geneva correspondent says he learns from Sofia that the betrothal of King Boris of Bulgaria to Princess Giovanna, third daughter of the Italian sovereigns, is "considered an accomplished fact."

King Boris, the only bachelor sovereign in Europe, left Bulgaria early this month, ostensibly for a holiday, but it was later intimated he Premier Lianoff that he was seeking a bride.

"Every young man of the king's age (32) naturally desires to meet his mate," the premier said. "Nothing definite has been settled in this regard. The king is absolutely free to act in the matter in accordance with his own good will."

There have been insistent rumors that Boris would seek an alliance with Princess Giovanna, who is in her nineteenth year, notwithstanding the difference in their religion. The princess, as a member of the house of Savoy, is a Catholic, while Boris is of the Orthodox faith.

Boris is at present in Switzerland. He is traveling incognito as "Count Ribi-Li" and his movements have been largely kept a secret. He is not reported to have visited Rome since leaving Sofia, although it is known he was at some of the northern Italian lake resorts.

FLOODS IN JAPAN DESTROY CROPS, RUIN VILLAGES

Thousands of Houses Under Water, Casualty List Large, Famine Is Threatened.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

TOKYO, July 30.—The toll of dead and missing in the terrific floods which have ravaged Nikita prefecture, on the west coast of the main island of Japan, was placed at 400 today, as numerous corps of relief workers entered the stricken district.

Already disease is reported to have followed in the wake of the waters of the Shinano river, adding to the misery of the population.

Seventy bodies have been recovered in the village of Tochio alone, this place having borne the brunt of the disaster.

TOKYO, July 30.—The meagre news that trickles in from the floods in Nikita province reveals a terrible toll in death and destruction. Latest reports fix the dead, injured and missing at about 300 and the damage to property at 10,000,000 yen.

The village of Tochio was worst hit of all the communities in this place 1,500 houses were demolished and many drowned. In the whole flooded area some 8,000 houses were submerged. Several thousand acres of rice fields were destroyed.

Other floods are reported in Akita and Yonezawa in north Japan.

Communications with the stricken district are broken down and is only with difficulty that information is obtained.

Heavy rains started the floods on Wednesday. The Shinano River overflowed its banks washing away houses and causing landslides. Many fled to the hills for safety. Others climbed to the roofs of houses. The cries of women and children for help and the floating bodies added to the distress of the situation.

Electric lights have been cut off in most of the villages and hunger is adding its torments to darkness. A relief corps from Nanzaka brought food and medical aid, but the assistance has been inadequate. The Red Cross and other relief agencies have started for the flood area from other cities.

The mayor of Tochio has asked for engineers and soldiers to aid in the rehabilitation work to the prefecture. It is stated that a population of 9,000 is suffering from food shortage.

NEW SWIMMING RECORDS

PHILADELPHIA, July 29.—Walter Spence, the Brooklyn Central Y. M. C. A.'s all-around aquatic star, established a world's record today, when he won the 200-meter medley in the national A. A. U. championships in the Squam-Centennial pool. Spence swam the distance, using three different strokes, in 4:25.2-5.

Arne Borg, Swedish member of the Illinois A. C. team, shattered his second world's record in two days, when he won the one-mile free style in 17:15.2-5, bringing the existing mark by 13 seconds.

DEATH TOLL IN BAHAMAS FROM STORM IS HEAVY

Over 150 Persons Missing, Most of Whom Believed to Have Perished.

75 SHIPS ARE LOST

Fate of Scores of Vessels Unknown—130 Mile an Hour Wind Wrecks City of Nassau.

NASSAU, New Province Island, Bahamas, July 30.—Ravaged by wind and wave, more than 150 persons missing, the Bahamas Islands remained virtually isolated from communication with the outside world today while anxious residents took further count of the toll of destruction from the worst hurricane in the recorded history of the islands.

The majority of those missing are believed to have been drowned with the sponge fishing fleet, which has not been seen since it set sail three days before the West Indian hurricane struck the islands Monday night. While conservative estimates place the damage at \$8,000,000, reports have not been received from several islands of the group and communication with them may not be established for days.

Over 75 Vessels Lost. Nassau, the beautiful capital of the Bahamas group, with a population of more than 12,000 presented a picture of desolation. Debris from uprooted trees, wrecked houses and splintered boats washed up by the waves, cluttered the stately driveways of the ancient city where virtually all business has been suspended. Abandoned efforts to repair her confusion Nassau turned first to search for the missing sponge fleet and to ascertain conditions on the other islands under her administration. The outer islands of the group are known to have suffered greatly but inside the far flung line of islands and banks and toward the coast of Florida, the chief damage was at Nassau and the Isle of Gun Key, 40 miles from Miami. Only three fishing smacks were left in Nassau Harbor from sixty craft which were moored there Sunday. Between 150 and 200 sloops are missing with the sponge fleet. Harbor officials estimated that at least 75 vessels were destroyed at Nassau and other islands, not counting the sponge boats, some of which possibly found shelter on isolated banks or near uninhabited islands.

Wind 130 Miles An Hour. The wind steadily increased in velocity throughout Sunday and at midnight a gale lashed the island, tearing houses from their foundations and uprooting trees. Waves were blown down and the public utility plants damaged to such an extent that the city was plunged into darkness. The government record showed the wind reached its velocity peak at 130 miles an hour at 6 o'clock Monday morning.

Among the vessels known to have sunk in the harbor was the 80-ton yacht, Loscoles, formerly the Shamrock, S. Sir Thomas, Liverpool. (Continued on page 5.)
