LA GRANDE, Ore., July 29.—The H. M. Maughlin lumber mill and yard on Powwaka Ridge, near Troy, Walla Walla county, was destroyed Monday and Tuesday nights with a loss estimated at \$17,000. It was burned here today. Lewis Carpenter, of the forest service, inspected the ruins and believes that the fire was of incendiary origin. The mill was destroyed Monday night and, although apparently extinguished, fire the following night swept the yards.

BUS SERVICE REMAINS ON SPRINGFIELD-EUGENE LINE

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
SALEM, Ore., July 30.—A petition of residents along the Southern Pacific interurban line between Eugene and Springfield, protesting against the abandonment of electric car service and the substitution of bus service, is denied in an order of the public service commission today. The commission holds that the bus service is a superior service for urban or interurban communities and is "safe, adequate and convenient."
