LET'S PUT THIS OVER.

Roseburg has need of a public playground for children—maybe several small playgrounds would be better—and the movement now under way to establish one, or more than one, carries the wishes of the municipality generally for its success. Well appointed playgrounds are component parts of all modern cities, and Roseburg should no longer be numbered among the laggards in that respect. The personnel of the public spirited citizens who are behind the project here precludes the necessity for any advice as to the essentials of a playground and such cooperation as they require should be accorded them full heartedly. It will require an appreciable sum of money, of course, to carry out the project, but no reasonable amount is too great when weighed in the balance against the physical and mental well-being of energetic and healthy pleasure-seeking youth. Attractive playgrounds, wisely situated and properly maintained, provided, among other requirements, with sanitary water for bathing and safeguards against traffic accidents, mean practically the total elimination of the dangerous practices of skating on heavily traveled streets, playing in the vicinity of railway tracks, hazardous bathing in polluted water, and indulgence in pastimes of questionable benefit beyond the eyes of elders. In the final word, the establishment and maintenance of playgrounds in Roseburg, as in other cities, are duties, not mere fads, and we should attend to them as thoroughly as we would any other indispensable matters.

The Douglas County Band is a vital asset to Roseburg. The organization affords a weekly program that is enjoyed by hundreds of people from the rural districts as well as the city folk. They should be well supported in their efforts. Nothing advertises a city more than a good, well-balanced band and Roseburg should feel justly proud of the efforts put forth by those responsible for this excellent musical organization.

The forest fire situation in this county for the past few days has reached rather an alarming degree and much valuable timber is being destroyed. If the report is true that many of the fires are of incendiary origin a determined effort should be made to bring the guilty parties to justice. With an army of fire bugs running at large it is next to impossible to cope with present conditions.

HARTZ, '26 LEADER
OF RACE DRIVERS
USES DODGE CAR

Harry Hartz, veteran automobile race driver, has all but annexed the American automobile association racing championship of 1926, as is reported by the board. He has piled up a total of 2194 points with his closest competitor possessing only 1475. The association regulates racing on the major tracks of the nation.

In a Miller 8-cylinder special he finished second in the 1925 Labor Day race on the board track at Altoona, Pa. For his personal use he bought a Dodge Brothers car, saying at the time that it had all the power and more speed than he needed on the highway.
