

DEATH TOLL IN BAHAMAS FROM STORM IS HEAVY

ton's famous America's cup challenger.

At the island of Gun Key, eight large run running boats, heavily laden with liquor were dashed to pieces by the waves. The crews escaped, rowing ashore in small boats at the first approach of the hurricane.

Mail Boat Lost.

Nothing was known of the fate of the government mail boat Bronco, which proceeded for San Salvador shortly before the onrush of the storm. The Albatross, with 10 persons aboard, sailed for the island of Inagua, a few hours before the hurricane struck. It was also dashed among the islanding craft. The mail boat carried 20 persons.

Craft Reduced to Debris.

Crews of the Munson Steamship Mahanar from New York and the Canadian Fisher from Kingston, Jamaica, which arrived at Nassau shortly after the storm, related tales of battling terrible winds and waves.

The Lizard was tossed broadside across the road on East Bay street, moving an obstruction to traffic. The old Ward Line Bulgaria, the coasting schooner Inflexible and the schooner Magle, all were lifted on rocks with other ships and small fishing boats.

The schooner Home Comfort, the two master Mathoke, the schooner Eula M. and the schooner Vim were smashed to kindling wood.

Governor Sir Harry Corleaux, in a public announcement, expressed his sympathy to the relatives of the many whom he believed had been killed.

Press Plane Rescued.

Hal I. Layson, of the Miami Daily News, and E. P. Mitchell, Miami correspondent of the Associated Press, were the newspaper men who pierced the wall of silence between Nassau and the outer world. Their flight by airplane was not without adventure. Forced down on a deserted island when fuel gave out, they were rescued by a chance seaplane in search of a missing yacht, which supplied sufficient fuel to resume the flight to Nassau.

Arriving at Nassau, the newspaper men found the wireless down and were unable to communicate with radio stations in Miami.

The correspondents' plane subsequently flew through the outer islands of the group, several of which revealed evidence of the severe storm.

Lighthouse Cracked.

Great Isaac Light, Britain's northernmost isle of the group, was hit full force. The roof of the only two wooden houses were stripped off, while the lighthouse showed large cracks in its sides. The promontory was stripped of all foliage and was hardly more than a denuded rock.

North and South Bimini, directly east of Miami, suffered likewise. The wreckage on the small islands offering ample proof of the storm, while to the south lay the famous Gun Key, termed the rendezvous of the bootlegger, now hardly more than a waste. The northern edge of Andros was described except at Morgan's Bluff. It appeared.

The hurricane played many strange pranks as it twisted its path tortuously through New Providence, leaving in its wake a tale of woe. The sloop Mystery J, which plied between Miami and Nassau, was lifted high up on the shore and far into a ruin warehouse, whose cases were piled with the choicest liquors.

HEAD OF PRUNE CONCERN PLEASED PRUNE OUTLOOK

A letter giving a very optimistic outlook on the prune situation in Oregon has been received by the Roseburg News-Review from M. J. Newhouse, manager of the North Pacific Cooperative Prune Co.

"The prune market can be reported as quiet but steady at prevailing prices. The early pressure on the part of growers to sell is no longer apparent. On the other hand, the trade has fairly well covered a portion of its early prune needs and is now generally awaiting prices on new crop California prunes. We look for no great market developments until these prices are known.

"Prune districts report that drying will start at or about the middle of August. This is the earliest, in recent years at least, that Oregon Italian prunes have been harvested. As the markets everywhere are fairly bare of Oregon fruit and little due to the failure of the crop in 1925 in

produce these sizes, the early harvest is appreciated by the trade. Just as the late summer on the Atlantic Coast added six weeks to the dried fruit consuming period, so arrivals of new crop prunes two or three weeks in advance of normal, will prove a big help in placing the big tonnage anticipated in the Pacific Northwest this year."

WOMAN BURNED BADLY WHEN GAS FUMES TAKE FIRE

LONGVIEW, Wash., July 29.—Gasoline fumes, igniting in a hot kitchen at Ostrander, near here today, burned Mrs. Clyde Richards, 32, so badly that grave fear was felt for her life. STATE REFUSES TO ADD UMPQUA ROAD TO ITS SYSTEM

could it allocate state or federal money to the project. The commission did offer, however, to survey the road, the county and district to meet the cost, and that the expense would be credited to the county and district whenever the state should receive and sanction it as a state road.

"The commission further went

on record as saying that it recognized the Umpqua highway as of great importance, and that it must or a necessity be eventually made a part of the state system, but held forth no hope for such an adoption in the immediate future. It was intimated, however, that there could be no further roads added to the state system until the Roosevelt highway has been completed.

"Regarding the county's resolution asking for advertising contracts on the remaining section of the Roosevelt highway, no action was taken, due to the fact that the improvement district has not agreed to obligate itself at least for its share. As the improvement district is greatly interested in completing

the Scottsburg-Drain section as in building the Roosevelt highway, the district may withhold its agreement to participate on the Roosevelt road, until the original proposition of carrying on both projects simultaneously is met by the state.
