TRUCKS PORTLAND TO VANCOUVER ARE TO BE COUNTED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

SALEM, Ore., July 29.—A traffic count of the trucks using the interstate bridge between Portland and Vancouver will be made Friday of this week by the state highway department and the traffic divisions of the public service commission of Oregon and Washington. The data obtained will be used in the Interstate Commerce Commission hearing in Portland, August 7th, relative to truck operations.

The trucks will be divided into four groups:

These will be private, such as farmer's vehicles; distributors, such as oil and bread trucks; and where for hire, and certified as common carriers. The truck capacity load carried, kind of tires, and the permit or certificate number as well as license number and owner's name will be taken. It is expected that all the information can be gotten in less than one minute per truck in most cases.

The interstate Commerce Commission desires information that will help in formulating national legislation for the regulation and protection of truck, stage and railroad transportation companies.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 29.—The Dornbecher memorial children's hospital was formally dedicated with appropriate services today.

Among the speakers were C. C. Koltz, Secretary of State Sam A. Cozer, Erwin A. Taft, Mayor Geo. L. Baker, Dr. J. H. Dornbecher, Dr. Richard H. Dillehunt and Miss Grace Phelps.

The hospital, which was made possible through the gift of \$200,000 by Edward M. Dornbecher and Mrs. W. B. Morse, in memory of their father, the latter Frank S. Dornbecher, pioneer Portland manufacturer, is a part of the University of Oregon medical school and the staff of the school is the staff of the hospital.
