To begin with, there is the robe de style which made lovely the costumes worn throughout a winter-time and springtime of formal affairs. These in taffetas were always distinguished, and now they are creating a favorable summer-time appearance both in taffetas and in laces and tulle. In all the lovely pastel tones they are to be found sharing favor with the all white or all black bouffant gown in laces and nets.

The peacock silhouette, which is as new as it is smart, is a great favorite in the formal gown and is particularly fetching in all black, which is to be worn so effectively at nighttime. The peacock silhouette boasts a short front and long, almost trainlike line at the back which may be obtained by panels, or a lengthened hem-line in the rear.

KNITTED STRIPED SWEATER

row) for eight rows, increasing one at, at end of every K row, knitting plain the five sts at opposite edge on all rows. Join red yarn, work in same way; place stitches on extra needle (32 sts.). For Front: Cast on 85 sts with red and work eight rows, knitting plain the five sts at beginning of purl rows for lower edge of front. Join white, work eight rows, increasing one at at beginning of every K row. Join red, work in same way (32 sts.). Return to first piece. Start at lower edge of back, join white, work across the 32 sts of back, cast on 45 sts, work across 67 sts of front, place remaining 26 sts on holder for pocket; cast on 21 sts for back of pocket.

On these 226 stitches work white, red and white stripes, omitting the five plain-knit sts on lower edge of front. Bind off the 21 sts at back of pocket. Take the 26 sts of pocket from holder, work three stripes same as on body of sweater, knitting plain the five sts at lower edge on all rows; place on extra needle, beginning at lower edge of back with red, work 205 sts, work across the 26 sts from extra needle, knitting plain the last five sts. Work six rows, and on last row of red stripe purl 112 sts; place on holder for front, bind off seven sts for side of neck. Purl remaining 12 sts, then work white, red and white stripe, and place stitches on holder.

Diet and Health

ANSWERS TO MOTHERS

God could not be everywhere; therefore He made mothers.—Jewish proverb.

PLEASE MILK AND ARTIFICIAL FEEDING.

Mrs. G.—There is no difference of opinion among physicians as to the superiority of the milk of the mother over the artificial food, although it is true that artificial feeding has been much simplified and is less hazardous than it used to be. The baby's own mother's milk is designed especially for her baby and he should have his heritage, if she is well enough to nurse. It is estimated that 95 percent of the mothers can nurse their babies.

Breast milk has just the right proportion of protein, fat, sugar, mineral elements and vitamins, especially of the mother has been eating correctly. It does not have to be modified. There are no bottles to sterilize; there is no danger of contamination from tuberculosis or scarlet fever or typhoid or other diseases from those who might be infected and handle the milk.

The breast-fed baby is not nearly so subject to digestive disturbances as the artificially fed baby, and he has a far greater chance of life.

If a mother cannot nurse her child entirely, she should nurse him partly, for even partial feedings of breast milk give the child more resistance and more ability to digest artificial food.

The factors making for good milk in the mother are mental and physical poise, correct diet, sufficient sleep, fresh air and a certain amount of exercise. Same, as the factors for good health, you see. The diet, naturally, is extremely important. The mother should have a quart of milk daily, in some form, liberal amounts of raw vegetables and fresh fruits, some nuts or fresh food or cottage cheese for protein, and only sufficient energy food (starches and sugar) to keep her at normal weight. It is not necessary or desirable for the mother to gain beyond normal weight.

JANNUATED BABIES. Mrs. R.—It is not unusual for the normal baby to be slightly jaundiced or yellowish from four to 15 days, beginning on the second or third day after birth.
