Choice light calves are down to 17 cents generally with 17c the extreme top and choice light hogs are down to 19 and 20 cents with the bulk of the sales around 19 and 19c.

UMATILLA RESIDENT FOR HALF CENTURY IS DEAD

PENDLETON, Aug. 3.—William Anderson, Umatilla county pioneer for 50 years, died yesterday at his home in Milton, following a four weeks' fight with paralysis. He was born at Edinburgh, Scotland, in 1846 and came to Canada as a youth. Fifty years ago he settled at Weston and engaged in farming, moving to Milton 30 years ago, where he served as a councilman and marshal for a long period.
