MOTORCYCLE ON ECONOMY TEST FOLLOWS SCHEDULE

The Single cylinder Harley-Davidson Motorcycle which is making a long distance economy test from Vancouver, B. C. to Tijuana, Mexico, arrived at Roseburg today in perfect condition at 8 a. m. After taking on gasoline and oil the machine was turned over to Darrel Carter, the rider who pilots the machine on its next lap toward Mexico. One of the features of this test is that the motor is not permitted to stop during the entire sixteen hundred miles, making the test difficult for both rider and machine. If this motor averages 80 miles per gallon of gasoline and 800 miles per gallon of oil, the claims of the factory will be sustained for that figure is being consistently made by riders throughout the country. If the reports made by the riders who have piloted this machine this far, are true, a record far in excess of 80 miles per gallon will be hung up.

Motorcycle enthusiasts all over the Coast are watching the progress being made by this strictly stock model for many of them believe that this type of motorcycle is destined to be the most popular type of personal transportation in the future. There is no question that the single cylinder machine is easy to handle and can be ridden safely by young and old alike. 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VITAL EVIDENCE IN HALL-MILLS CASE IS MISSING

SOMERVILLE, N. J., Aug. 3.—Important evidence in the sensational Hall-Mills murder case is missing from the official files.

Transcripts of statements made by witnesses in the inquiry four years ago have been removed from the safe of the warden of Somerset county jail, according to State Senator Simpson, newly appointed special prosecutor.

Despite the handicap Senator Simpson expressed belief he had sufficient evidence at hand to indict a woman and at least two men for the murder of the Rev. Dr. Edward W. Hall and Mrs. Eleanor R. Mills.

Statements of five persons under suspicion were said to be missing, while 16 hairs, speckles with finger marks wiped off, were saved.

The senator said one of his first steps would be to learn how this evidence disappeared and who is responsible for its disappearance.
