DRAINAGE DIST. IN N. ROSEBURG TO BE CREATED

Council to Proceed With Plans to Remove Surface Water.

TO ASSESS COST

Plans Will Relieve Condition North of Deer Creek Bridge in Flood Season.

Creation of a drainage district in North Roseburg, in order to take care of surface water which now collects at the intersection of Jackson street and Second avenue south, was ordered by the city council last night.

It was proposed some time ago as a means of relieving the existing situation, and at last night's meeting the engineer was ordered to prepare plans and specifications for the proposed improvement.

Practically all of North Roseburg, improved by paved streets, drains surface water down to a focus at the intersection of Second avenue south and Jackson streets.

In the winter time the water stands in a great lake at that corner, but heretofore has done little damage, other than to keep wood sidewalks afloat.

Since the construction of the Cresson building, however, it has become necessary for the city to make some plan to dispose of the water, for otherwise it will overflow into the basement of the business building.

It was at first proposed to construct a drain into Deer Creek in front of the Cardwell property, but because of the heavy excavation necessary this plan was held too expensive.

The low spot comes about midway on the east and west sides of the Cresson building, so that this system, by passing across in front of the building with connecting drains up each side, would fully cope with the situation.

The cost of the first proposal was in the neighborhood of \$2,700, while the second proposal can be carried out with a cost of approximately \$1,500, it is believed.

It is proposed to assess the cost of the construction against all of the property draining into the system, which would include practically all of North Roseburg west of the Benson school.

Plans will be submitted, it is expected, at the next meeting of the city council.

The committee on health and police, which has been investigating the matter, submitted its report last night, recommending that the council proceed at once with the formation of the district, in order that the work may be completed before the fall rains start.

Other Business Light

Aside from the proposed improvement, the council had little business for consideration last night.

The recorder submitted a report recommending that the council transfer bond premium funds to the general fund and that the money be used to take up warrants outstanding in improvement funds on which there is an unpaid balance. The report was adopted and the transfer ordered.

The action of the mayor and recorder in buying a machine for painting traffic lines on the street was modified.

H. O. Parsoner presented a petition asking for the paving of Clark street, 221 feet north from the present paving. As he is owner of all property affected by water advertising and other incidental costs, the improvement being ordered.

The resignation of Woodley Stephenson as night fire truck driver was accepted, and the application of Joe Fredrickson for the position was placed on file.

The street committee reported

that the elm tree at the library grounds has been sprayed. The tree was being destroyed by elm beetles.
