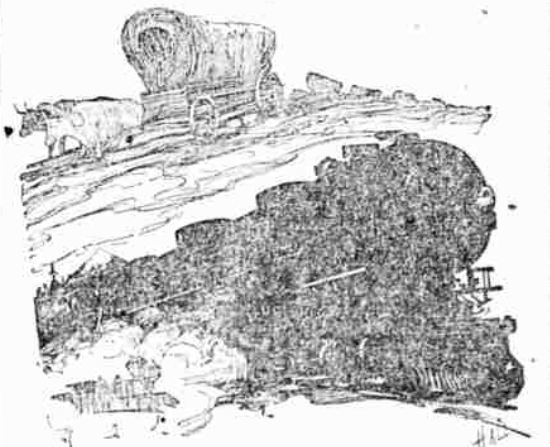

CLAMOR FOR MORE
LAWS MENACE TO
COUNTRY—NEUNERFederal Attorney Visions
Time When One Out of
Every Five Will Be
An Official.

Attaching what he termed to be a steadily increasing multiplicity of laws, with a corresponding increase of officials and special boards, George Neuner of Portland, United States district attorney for Oregon Wednesday told the Salem Rotary club that "at this rate within 25 years there will be one officer to herd every three or four of us around and tell us where to go and what to do," says the Salem Capitol Journal.

"Today there is one official of some kind to less than 20 of population," he said. "Twenty-five years ago there was one to every 200."

A considerable part of the speaker's time was taken up with describing the effects of the narcotic evil in the United States, victims of which are dealt with by his office.

"There is serious danger from minority rule in this country," he declared, "brought about by lack of public interest in government affairs."

"The time has long since arrived when even a lawyer does not hope to know all the law—he only tries to be able to find it when he needs it. Yet with all the laws we already have, there are 2,000 institutions and organizations from all parts of the country knocking at the door of congress and demanding the passage of more laws."

Narcotic Evil Widespread

Touching on the law enforcement situation, particularly with reference to the prohibition laws, Mr. Neuner said, "I believe in a due and proper respect for all laws, yet I do not believe in making a felony out of a misdemeanor. Our aim is to handle the offender of magnitude. During the past six months he has been called upon to prosecute 291 prohibition cases, a large proportion of which were 'nothing more than police court cases,' he stated. The number of prohibition cases amounted to four-tenths of the total number of cases handled. He also prosecuted 11 narcotic cases and 35 white slavery cases.

Mr. Neuner declared that there are three counties in the state of Oregon where the local officials cannot be depended upon to enforce the prohibition statutes to the best of their ability. He did not name the counties.

Referring to the narcotic situation, the speaker asserted that it "is one of the greatest evils that confronts our country today. The average layman hasn't the slightest conception of its extent."

State laws are "absolutely nil" in dealing with the narcotic situation, he said.

The four principal drugs used in this country are opium, morphine, heroin and cocaine, the speaker asserted. The per capita consumption of drugs in this country is eight grains, as compared with four grains in England, two in Germany and one in Italy.

Concluding his speech with an appeal for support of officials and an increased interest on the part of the people in public affairs, Neuner stated that "today when a man announces himself for office he's branded as a crook; when he wins a nomination he's indicted; and when he's elected he's convicted. If people would only take an interest in public affairs we could do away with the slysters and crooks who are running around with authority planned on their breasts and think they're the whole court."

"A man who takes his oath to enforce the laws and then secretly violates them himself is the one who should be put behind prison bars—he's the main one we're after."

If they can be made to say kindly things about the city, if thoughts of the town linger in their memory, then Roseburg is bound to receive much benefit. Each tourist can be made an enthusiastic booster if proper efforts are made to interest him in the community, the picture shows.

Each Friday one of these films will be shown at the Antlers theatre, each dealing with some new feature of community life or welfare. They will doubtless prove very interesting as well as calling attention of the residents to means for promoting the best interests of the city.

\$20,000 BOOZE HAUL
MADE NEAR NEWPORT

NEWPORT, Ore., Aug. 5.—The largest seizure of bonded liquor ever made on the Oregon coast occurred yesterday when Sheriff Horstfall, assisted by Deputies Plank and Black and State Agents Charles Overton, and William Mathews, unearthed a cargo cached at White Cove 12 miles north of here.

The estimated value of the liquor is \$20,000. No arrests have yet been made.

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MEDFORD CHAMBER
HEARS AN ADDRESS
ON DIAMOND LAKETakes Neutral Stand Until
Community as a Whole
Gives Sentiment at
Friday's Meet.

MEDFORD, Aug. 5.—The directors of the Medford Chamber of Commerce at their meeting last evening, in a long drawn out discussion in which there was considerable disagreement, but little definite argument, decided by a slight majority to dispose of the Diamond lake inclusion question, as far as the board of directors officially was concerned, by leaving it alone.

Bert Anderson appeared before the board and made it plain that he was against the inclusion of Diamond lake, said Mr. Anderson, is a national park, stating that he believed that 95 per cent of the people of southern Oregon are of the same mind in the matter. Diamond lake, said Mr. Anderson, is the great playground of the common people of southern Oregon, and to place it within the national park boundaries would destroy its popularity as a recreation and camping spot, would place it under the most stringent national park rules and would spoil it for the common people. Crater Lake, as a great natural wonder is already surrounded by sufficient territory to preserve its natural beauty and insure its continued wild state. Diamond lake is already within a national forest, the restrictions at the present time being strict enough to insure the preservation of timber around the shores and ideal hunting and camping conditions.

"The ordinary working man who wants a few days vacation, wants to dress in his oldest clothes, take his wife along in an old calico dress, pile his kids into a flivver, pitch a tent and enjoy himself, doesn't go to Crater Lake," said Mr. Anderson. "He doesn't want to go and camp next to a lodge full of New Jersey millionaires in 13-room Arrow sedans, and he stays out of the national parks. He goes to the national forest or the state parks, where there are such."

Western states are conserving themselves to death, Mr. Anderson pointed out. In many of them nearly half the area being in national forests and national parks under the control of the federal government, and not contributing taxes to the support of the state. Once land is included in a national park, it is gone forever from the tax rolls. If it remains in the national forest, it has a chance of some day becoming taxable.

Grazing privileges would be lost, stockmen and sheepmen would be inconvenienced, cabin owners along the shores of Diamond lake would be dispossessed, no further summer home building would take place there, private homes would not be owned or run on the lake, fishing would be under federal restriction, the state game commission would lose one of its best egg-taking stations and much money, as thousands of people buy licenses to fish in Diamond lake every year. If it is included in the Crater Lake National park it will not be necessary to buy a state license to fish there. The park entrance fee will give them the privilege of fishing on federal land. Thus Mr. Anderson summed up the situation.

The board, after deciding by a narrow vote, not to take any official action as a body, voted to appoint a committee to get members of the chamber and residents of the community out for the hearing of the co-ordination committee Friday, so that the true opinion of the community may be expressed in front of the members of the co-ordination committee which will decide the inclusion question for the federal government.
