OREGON EXPORT TRADE OPENS WITH FINE OUTLOOK

Total for First Quarter of Year Far Over That for Same Period Year Ago.

Oregon boosted its merchandise shipments abroad during the first quarter of 1926 by well over \$3,000,000, as compared with the corresponding period of 1925, according to statistics released today by the Department of Commerce. The exports of this state totaled \$13,781,451 for January, February and March, as compared with \$10,675,447 a year ago, reflecting an increased trade amounting to \$3,105,904.

Incidentally, this increase enabled Oregon to jump its relative standing among the various states of the union in the quarterly race for foreign markets from twenty-fifth place at the end of March, 1925, to nineteenth place at the conclusion of the first three months of 1926, surpassing Minnesota, Arkansas, Mississippi, Tennessee, Alabama and Oklahoma.

Wheat, grain and flour, dominated the exports during the quarter, and amounted to \$7,216,316. Second place fell to the classification, wood and manufactures of \$2,831,769, while third honors went to apples, whose total shipments abroad for the three-month period totaled \$1,933,430. Items of lesser importance in their order, were: hops, \$729,611; condensed milk, \$448,913, and fish valued at \$215,961.

Total exports from the United States during the first three months of this year amounted to \$1,098,529,213, as compared with \$1,259,769,000 for the corresponding quarter of 1925, and with \$1,351,460,317 for the last three months of 1925.

The first ten states in the order of their importance in export trade during the first quarter of this year were New York, with export valuations of \$198,510,971; Texas, \$128,573,615; Michigan, \$71,745,825; Pennsylvania, \$65,515,247; California, \$63,652,164; Louisiana, \$62,653,616; New Jersey, \$55,777,789; Illinois, \$52,429,351; Ohio, \$49,917,550; and Virginia, with exports totaling \$37,398,650.

Of these states, Michigan, California, Ohio and Virginia made export gains during the quarter review, while New York, Texas, Pennsylvania, Louisiana, New Jersey and Illinois suffered export declines. Michigan's increase was the largest and amounted to more than \$18,000,000. It was followed in order by California, with a gain of nearly \$8,000,000; Virginia, with over \$6,000,000; and Ohio, with almost \$1,000,000. Texas sustained an export loss amounting to nearly \$121,000,000, due chiefly to decreased shipments abroad of cotton and at lower prices. Pennsylvania's export trade declined about \$15,000,000, and New York's drop approximated \$8,000,000 for the three-month period. The other losses incurred were: Louisiana, \$7,700,000; New Jersey, \$1,750,000; and Illinois, slightly over \$900,000.

Compared with the first three months of last year, New York jumped from second place into the leadership as an exporting state, exchanging places with Texas. Michigan advanced from eighth to third place, and California from sixth to fifth position. Pennsylvania dropped from third place to fourth, Louisiana from fourth to sixth, New Jersey from fifth to seventh, and Illinois from seventh to eighth place. Ohio and Virginia retained their ninth and tenth places, respectively.

In continuing this Commerce Department foreign trade statistical service in which an attempt is made to show the relative quarters by standing of the different states and regions of the Union in competition for exports, Dr. Julius Klein, director of the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, under whose charge the figures are compiled, again calls attention to the fact that the statistics are based primarily on through-bills of lading, and, therefore, in the case of some states, show but a part of the total export trade and for others include goods produced elsewhere.

NEBRASKA MAN ON WAY TO ROSEBURG BY TEAM TO RESIDE WITH BROTHER

PRINEVILLE, Aug. 5.—Enroute to Roseburg, Oregon, to make his home with his brother, W. J. Klinger, Shadron, Nebraska, was in Prineville yesterday with a team of ponies, three fourths Shetland, with which he has made the trip through Wyoming, Idaho and eastern Oregon, having been on the road since May 21. He has avoided the highways as much as possible. He passed through Casper, Sweetwater, Eden Valley, Teton Pass, Victor, Vale, Iron Mountain, John Day, Antone, and Summit prairie and expects to reach Roseburg Sunday. He averages about 25 miles a day and his best day's drive was 49 miles.

FARM NEWS

(By County Agent Cooney.)

The sheep industry in Douglas county represents a very profitable enterprise to those engaged in the business. Nevertheless, flock owners have their full share of problems to solve. Possibly the greatest annual loss to the business comes through infestation of pests and diseases. Recent examination of several reported losses seem to indicate the trouble to be a disease known as Hemorrhagic Septicemia.

Informal investigations of the disease are not all agreed upon its contagious nature, but do agree upon the fatality of the disease and methods of prevention. Every sheep owner naturally views a heavy loss with alarm but takes the loss of 6 or 8 per cent as a matter of course. This view point may or may not be the right attitude, but one thing is certain, avoidable exposure to disease is very bad management. Hemorrhagic Septicemia can be prevented by vaccination with the proper serum.

The Department of Bacteriology of the Oregon Agricultural College is prepared to furnish flock owners with serum through the county agent's office at a cost of one cent per dose. Any stockman can readily make the injection if properly equipped with a good hypodermic syringe. No effort will be made to give the symptoms of this disease as they are many and complex. It is always advisable to call in the service of a trained veterinarian for consultation. Stock owners attention is again called to the impossibility of effecting a cure of this disease. The only safe step to take is one of prevention by the use of a reliable vaccine.

The old statement of "a stitch in time, saving nine" is emphatically true with this livestock disease. Reference has been made to Hemorrhagic Septicemia as effecting sheep. Owners of cattle and swine should also be concerned as their stock are as subject to the disease as sheep.

Farmers' Bulletin No. 1013 gives considerable information on this disease and within the range of this article. Copies can be secured by writing or calling at the county agent's office.

NEW ELECTRIC POWER UNIT IN COMMISSION.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 5.—A new \$1,000,000 unit in station "1" of the Portland Electric Power company at the foot of Lincoln street went into commission today when Mayor Baker, surrounded by a group of city officials and business men, opened the steam throttle that put into service the plant 27,000 horsepower steam-turbine-generator. With this new unit in service, the Portland Electric Power company now has a total generating capacity of 181,272 horsepower of electric energy.

WILLAMETTE SETS NEW LOW RECORD.

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 5.—The Willamette river reached a new low level record here today, when a reading of minus 6 feet was reported by the weather observer. The stream is so low that the sand had to be shoveled away from the gauge in order to obtain the reading. The zero mark on the gauge was set many years ago at a time of low water and the readings since then have been from that base line. This is the first year that minus readings have been taken.

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
