over by the municipal authorities.

K. of C. Protest.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 5.—The Knights of Columbus in annual convention today unanimously adopted a statement protesting against the policy of President Calles in the religious situation in Mexico.

The statement called the attention of the American government "to remind it that the representatives of Calles have insulted and degraded and expelled American citizens, men and women under circumstances that are abhorrent to our conception of constitution-

al government. "We warn our fellow-American citizens," the statement said, "that they cannot endure at their very door step, with impunity, the Russification of Mexico."

After stating that religious and civil liberties have been denied in Mexico, the statement asserts that "all this system in Mexico has been created under American auspices, maintained by American executive authority, which, in the first place, while refusing to recognize Lenin and Trotsky, have, by executive order of recognition, accepted Calles and Obregon, who are the enthusiastic supporters of the 'Bolshevik concept of government'."

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—A resolution that every precaution was being taken to safeguard the treaty rights of American nationals in Mexico was the only state department comment today on the statement of the Knights of Columbus relating to the Mexican religious situation.

SMITH TESTIFIES HE "UNDERSTOOD" INSULL GAVE COIN

Another Witness at Senate Quiz Alleges Chicago Polls Controlled By Gunmen.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

CHICAGO, Aug. 5.—Frank L. Smith, Republican senatorial nominee in Illinois, testified today before the senate campaign committee that during the recent primary campaign he "understood" that Samuel Insull, Chicago public utility magnate, had contributed funds to his candidacy.

"It was common talk in the campaign," Smith told Chairman Reed, "in fact became an issue in the campaign and charges were made by opponents."

"Did you deny it?" Reed asked. "In a speech at Springfield during the campaign, I said that if one who had paid \$38,000,000 in reduced rates to the public wanted to contribute to my campaign I saw no reason why he should not do so."

The chairman of the Illinois commerce commission, which controls rates on public utilities, in the state, said he had no definite information from Allen P. Moore, his campaign manager, that Insull had actually contributed to his campaign fund. The testimony is that the utilities executive gave \$125,000 directly and spent \$32,925.19 for propaganda against the world court which benefited Smith's candidacy.

Gunmen Controlled Polls. Turning fully to the affairs of the Anti-Saloon league of Illinois, the investigators learned from Dr. George F. Safford, superintendent of the city organization, raised \$180,000 in the year ending last April, of which \$13,125 went to the national league and \$6,581.15 for "law enforcement."

Dr. Safford said his organization took some part in politics in this state.

Marvin Eller, Republican boss of the 20th ward, told a naive story of how he controlled his ward, and charged that County Judge Edmund Jarecki and election commissioner Czarnicki were responsible for frauds in his ward because they appointed "ex-convicts and gunmen" as election judges and clerks.

"Will you bring us the names of these ex-convicts and gunmen?" asked Chairman Reed.

"I certainly will this afternoon," Eller promised.

Investigation of Illinois' million dollar primary was concluded today by the committee, which adjourned subject to the call of Chairman Reed.

HELEN WILLS IN RETURN TO COURT BEATS MISS GOSS

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ROSEBURG MEN TO PROTEST DIAMOND LAKE INCLUSION

MEDFORD, Ore., Aug. 5.—The president's coordination commission considering the inclusion of Diamond Lake and a large area of national forest property in Crater Lake National Park, were at Crater Lake last night and will hold a hearing at Diamond Lake this evening, making the trip there this morning.

Witnesses from Roseburg will be at Diamond Lake in force to protest against the inclusion, headed by Guy Corson, district attorney of Douglas county; A. C. Masters, Roseburg banker; E. H. Ness of the California-Oregon Power company; and Lloyd Crocker, formerly of Roseburg and now deputy state game warden at Diamond Lake.

A hearing will be held in Medford Friday evening at which many witnesses are expected to appear, a list of 40 names of those who wish to be heard before the commission having already been turned in at the Chamber of Commerce.

There is a great deal of interest in the matter locally and sportsmen are expected to be out in force. It is predicted that 150 or 200 witnesses will seek a hearing before the commission Friday evening.
