

NINE NEW FIRES ARE REPORTED TO COUNTY PATROL

is seriously affected. Smoke Hides Forests

O. C. Houser, of the Umpqua national forest office, reports that so far as lookouts are able to observe there are no new fires on the forest. Vision is obscured, however, by the great volume of smoke now hanging over the hills, so that it is impossible to obtain an accurate check on the entire territory held by the government.

Control has been gained over the fires in the flames knob district near Tiller, and so far no new fires have been started in that locality.

Montana-Idaho Situation. MISSOULA, Mont., Aug. 6. — Little headway is being made against the forest fires in the northwest and the flames continue to spread leaving desolation behind them. Another life was claimed yesterday, when an aged woods worker named Landstrom died while fighting fire near Donald, D. C.

On the previous day Corran Hutchinson, 60, a rancher, perished in the flames near Sand Point, Idaho.

The high winds which spread the flames over numerous forests early in the week, have subsided. It is reported to forest headquarters that the flames on the Blackfoot, the Flathead and the Pend Oreille forests were scattered over wide areas by the gale. Scout reports from the Pend Oreille indicate a great spread of the Carlton and Meadow Creek fires into timbered, drainage areas.

Forest headquarters here reports that already this year the flames have burned over 220,000 acres in the district comprising western Montana and northern Idaho. This is nearly four times as much as the total area burned in 1924 and 1925. During the last days of July, 112,160 acres, or more than half of the total

area this season burned. Of the 220,000 acres, 170,000 acres were within the national forests and the remainder was privately owned land burned lying some distance from the national forests.

rise. For the first two miles after she caught up with the tug, Miss Ederle continued mechanically at 28 to 29 strokes a minute, making good progress. The sea was calm and she raised her goggles over her forehead for several hundred yards, saying: "It will be time enough to look through these things when the breeze freshens."

"Strictly business," was the motto aboard the conveying tug, with only Miss Ederle's father, sister, Trainer Burgess, Leah Helmy and a swimming federation official, Joe Costa, aboard besides the crew.

Photograph Gives Cheer. Newspaper men and photographers followed on the ocean going tug La Morinie. The pilots of both tugs did their best to shield the swimmer from the increasing breeze which arose about noon before Miss Ederle had been in the water five hours. At that time she was nine miles out. There was no jazz band aboard the tug, but a phonograph began to grind: "Yes sir, she's my baby."

At 1 p. m. Miss Ederle had covered more than twelve miles and was still swimming strongly. Weather and sea conditions were unchanged.
