RAIDERS STIR UP INTERNATIONAL ROW IN BALKAN REGION

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

BELGRADE, Aug. 6.—A semi-official note, ominous in tone, says the Jugo-Slav government has ordered an inquiry into the recent incident on the Bulgarian frontier and "is envisaging certain measures of a nature definitely to assure the safety of Jugo-Slav territory."

The note adds that the government's decision on the situation is expected at an early date. Political circles regard the situation as one of great gravity. At the same time it is asserted that alarmist reports in foreign newspapers concerning measures taken have no foundation in fact. It is said that the government's object is to try to find some method of removing for the future all causes which are likely to menace good relations between the Balkan states.

The Jugo-Slav government recently protested to Bulgaria against raids by Comandji bands (irregular forces) into Jugo-Slav territory. In reply Bulgaria denied that the raiders had received support from the Bulgarian government. On the contrary, it was added, Bulgaria was doing everything possible to compel "the Macedonian revolutionaries" to cease activities likely to create hostility between Bulgaria and her neighbors.

The Bulgarian reply asked why Bulgaria's neighbors, with larger standing armies than the army of Bulgaria, were not allowed by treaties to police their own frontiers.

It was added that Rumania had agreed to do this and Bulgaria suggested that Jugo-Slavia do likewise.

AGED INDIAN ASKS OPPORTUNITY FOR YOUNGER ELEMENT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

FORT DUCHESNE, Utah, Aug. 6.—William Wash, leading tribesman of the Uintah branch of the Indian inhabitants of the Uintah reservation, yesterday through an interpreter, pleaded for a better opportunity for the younger generation of red men of this section to earn a living from the soil.

In an address delivered in his native tongue at the industrial and agricultural exposition of the district, he asked Dr. George Otis Smith, director of the bureau of geological survey, of the United States Department of the Interior, to carry back to Washington a message to Secretary Work urging appropriations for the reclamation and development of this section of the state.

More than 5,000 attended the sessions yesterday and the exposition will come to an end today. "I am getting old," Wash told Dr. Smith. "It is not so much for myself or the older Indians that I care for. We have always lived like Indians and want to continue to live like Indians. But it is the younger Indians that we want given much help. We know this land of ours will grow plenty, and we want the young Indians to have homes and we want the land developed."

Wash continued to explain that the younger Indians were being educated in the ways of their white fathers, to grow livestock and till the soil.

CHARGES AGAINST AGENT OF CLATSOP COUNTY DISPROVED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

CORVALLIS, Ore., Aug. 6.—E. W. McMindes, county agent of Clatsop county for the last five years, will not be removed from office by the extension service of the Oregon Agricultural College, as requested by 125 signers of a petition asking removal last April. A report completely exonerating McMindes of all charges against him and blaming the attack against him to personal animus on the part of a small group, has been made in the case by E. F. Ballard, county agent leader, who conducted a public hearing at Astoria to air the matter, and who also carried through a searching personal investigation. The report has been approved by Paul V. Maris, director of extension, and the county court of Clatsop county, thus closing the matter.

MARKET RATINGS

SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 6.—The annual lamb crop this year will exceed 2,000,000, an increase of approximately 10 per cent. George A. Scott, federal livestock statistician, says in his July report on the sheep and wool outlook. The increase is almost entirely in the eleven western livestock states.

Supplies of slaughter lambs for the next six months will be larger than for the same period last year, due to the fact that demand for the first half of the year was at the same rate as for the corresponding period a year ago. This is ascribed by Scott to the high prices asked for all other meats. Lamb prices averaged about \$1.50 less this year than last, due to the lower pel values. Concluding, the report forecasts a drop of from 6 to 10 per cent in prices during the next year, and adds there is no prospect of an improvement in the wool market.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 6.—Demand continues good for top grade butter and prices are well maintained. Slight accumulation, however, on ordinary grades.

Egg market generally steady with a cent decline in firsts to 32c, the only change on the local daily board.

No change is shown in country dressed meats and poultry for the day. Trading is slow along the street with only a limited demand shown. Fair good movement of heavy poultry for the Saturday trade.

Several small fires were set this week in the neighborhood of Shively and Heals Creeks. Local men are fighting these.

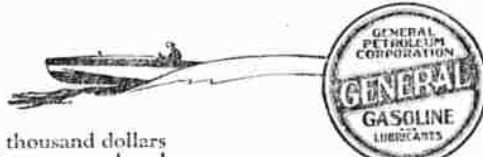
The annual meeting for voting the school budget will be held on Monday night, August 9, at the school house and every one is urged to attend.—Treble.
