FLIER IS KILLED, SECOND TRYING TO AID FATALLY HURT

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

RANTOUL, Ill., Aug. 6.—One flier was killed at Champaign Field here today and another who flew to his assistance crashed down beside him, receiving injuries expected to prove fatal.

First Lieutenant C. E. Partridge, Chicago, was flying at a height of 500 feet when his plane went into a tail spin and fell.

Flying Cadet Harold C. Wilson of Solvitz Field, Michigan, flew his plane to Partridge's assistance, went into a side slip at the same place and altitude and crashed less than 150 yards away. Wilson was taken from the wreckage unconscious. Partridge was dead when extracted. Lieutenant J. R. Wolf, Chicago, Wilson's passenger, was injured seriously.

MEN TO REPLACE WOMEN IN UNION PACIFIC SYSTEM

OMAHA, Neb., Aug. 6.—The Union Pacific railroad gradually will replace its women employees on the Omaha to Ogden, Utah, system by men, as vacancies occur in all positions except stenographers and computer operators, under an order issued by W. M. Jeffers, general manager.

G. H. Sines, assistant to the vice president, in charge of operations, explained that no women would be dismissed.

Sines declines to discuss reasons for the order or whether it would extend to other parts of the Union Pacific system, which includes lines west of Ogden and through Kansas.

About six hundred women are now employed at Omaha headquarters, and third class stenographers and computer operators.

The normal replacement of women employees is said to be largely due to the fact that many marry each year or leave for other reasons, leading to the belief that women will be cut out to a nominal figure in a few years.

NINE INCENDIARY FOREST FIRES IN JACKSON COUNTY

Jackson County Fires

MEDFORD, Ore., Aug. 6.—Eight forest fires, some of incendiary origin, authorities say, are raging today on state-owned land in Jackson county and are being fought by 100 fire fighters recruited from this city.

Forty men were sent out this morning to battle flames in timber of the Owen-Oregon Lumber company near Butte Falls. A fire covering 350 acres belched by forestry officials to have been started by firebugs, is burning on timber land in the Evans Creek district, threatening the timbered areas.

A brush fire on Blackwell hill, between Gold Hill and Central Point, on the Pacific highway, last night, was under control today.

HALF OF CHILDREN HERE ARE ILLEGITIMATELY BORN

KLAGENFURT, Austria, Aug. 6.—Statistics issued by the Provincial Government show that sixty per cent of all children born in the Klagenfurt district during the last year were illegitimate.

This is ascribed to loose legislation affecting the marriage relation. In Vienna, owing to the liberal laws enacted by the Social Democrats, children born out of wedlock may be legitimized by the father securing a divorce from his former wife and marrying the mother of the illegitimate baby. But in Klagenfurt, where the church is still all powerful, it is virtually impossible for a man to obtain a divorce from his wife if the marriage was contracted under canonical law.
