IOWA G. O. P. MAY NAME WOMAN FOR CUMMINS' PLACE

DES MOINES, Iowa, Aug. 6.—Iowa Republicans gathered here today for their second convention in two weeks, with the line of division in the party again discernible.

Today's convention has a single purpose, to nominate a candidate for the unexpired term of Senator Albert B. Cummins, whose death came a week after the party, in regular convention, forgot past differences with Colonel Smith W. Brookhart, successful opponent of Cummins in the June primary, accepted him as the nominee.

The death of Senator Cummins apparently has re-marked the former factional lines, followers of the veteran leader having declared themselves as favoring only a man of his views as his successor, while Brookhart men assert the situation calls for Brookhart to take up the fight for farm relief even sooner than otherwise would be possible.

A compromise candidate, possibly a woman, has been suggested by some leaders as the solution to the party problem of harmony.

MORALE IN SOVIET FORCES UPSET BY POLITICAL FUSS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—Differences between Soviet leaders have resulted in alarming conditions in the Russian army and navy, according to a dispatch from Reval broadcast by the French official wireless station at Bordeaux and picked up by the New York World.

The World quotes the dispatch as saying the Soviet commissioner and residents of Moscow are alarmed over the spirit of the fighting forces following the circulation of charges against the present executive committee, by

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Gregory Zinovieff, head of the communist third international.

Numerous arrests in Moscow gardens are reported, and Max Janski, the newly appointed chief of the secret police, has been empowered to arrest all communists, "however situated."

Leaders of the fleet of Cronstadt have been summoned, the dispatch adds.

MOTORCYCLE TEST RUN FINISHED YESTERDAY

The three-flag economy test made by the Harley-Davidson Motorcycle company was completed at Tia Juana, Mexico, at 12:20 p. m. Aug. 5. This was a test in which a single cylinder stock motorcycle was passed from dealer to dealer, while a close check was kept on the fuel consumed during the run. The fuel tanks were kept securely locked and the engine was not allowed to stop running at any time. The trip was made from Canada to Mexico, riders being changed about every 100 miles. The total distance traveled was 1,735 miles, while the gasoline consumed was 165.8 gallons. The total oil used being 114 pints.

SON ARRESTED AT SIDE OF MURDERED, MUTILATED MOTHER

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., Aug. 6.—Mrs. Etta S. Bearse, divorced wife of County Treasurer Fred A. Bearse, was murdered and her body mutilated today. Richard C. Bearse, 25, a son, found by the police at his mother's side, was arrested, charged with murder. He told an incoherent story, which indicated he was mentally unbalanced.

Mrs. Bearse's death apparently was due to strangulation.
