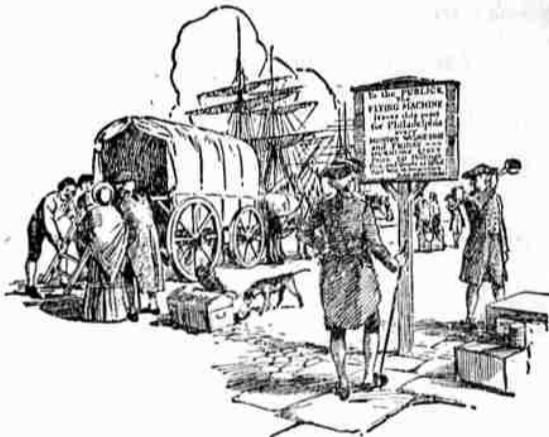

Conquering Limitations

JOHN MERCEREAU'S stage coach lumbered its creaking way from New York to Philadelphia in a day and a half, in 1771, and was considered so fast that it was called "The Flying Machine."
