FALL KILLS BOY AT TRAINING SCHOOL

SALEM, Aug. 7.—Liberty Shelton, 11, was almost instantly killed when he fell out of the third story window of the boys' dormitory at the Salem Indian school during the night. It is thought that he was walking in his sleep. He was in bed when the watchman made his rounds at 11 o'clock but was missed at 1 o'clock and search revealed his lifeless body directly beneath the window. Death was due to a broken neck. The lad had been at the school but a week, coming from the Hopi reservation in California. A sister, Ruth, 15, has been at the school for two years. His parents and other brothers survive at Hopi.
