**PENDLETON, Ore., Aug. 9—**

Hugh Sprout, executive secretary of the Oregon Wool Growers association, with headquarters here, takes issue with statements credited to fire wardens regarding incendiary setting of forest fires in Douglas county which they blame on stockmen.

"While such things may be done, there is a very grave doubt in my

mind that stockmen are to blame," said Mr. Sprout. "I think the stockmen are entitled to a very thorough investigation of the charges made. The wardens might better look to men who are fighting the fires. They pick up every Tom, Dick and Harry to fight these fires and pay them big wages. Possibly they might have more interest in continued employment than the stockmen in losing what range they have."

"Personally I am inclined to be much more afraid of fires set by fire fighters than by stock men with sheep in the timber. While I am not acquainted with Douglas county conditions, such conditions do not exist over the rest of the state. Burning forests at this time of the year would do more damage to grass roots than to any gain that might be had through burning over the ranges for future pasturage."
