FARM REMINDERS

The value of thinning whinsaps in the Milton-Freewater district was shown in tests supervised by the state college extension service. Whinsaps on reaching mature age tend to produce small fruit if unthinned. Results of the test showed practical value of thinning as much as six inches or more. This is particularly true where good grades and high color are required.

The cost of producing feeder lambs under conditions prevailing in the fall of 1925 with wool at 40 cents a pound was \$9.21 per 40-pound weight according to investigations by the experiment station. Under the same conditions the cost of producing early feeder lambs was \$9.90 per hundred weight.

Bee colonies located on a site with good drainage and protected from prevailing cold winds have proved most successful in Oregon in tests conducted by the college extension service. Bees out more stores when cold winds strike west hives. Windbreaks on the north and west are especially good in Oregon. The hives do not face the prevailing winds.

If Oregon creameries would form group organizations principally to standardize manufacture and sale of their products it would be possible to reduce costs of selling, says the experiment station. This would also establish their products on the market in a way certain to give them a more permanent relation to the consuming public.

Red spider mites on hops cause serious injury in seasons of prolonged drought accompanied by high temperatures, says the O. A. C. experiment station. Sulfur in some form is the standard control.

Hungarian vetch is the best vetch for Oregon lands rather low, flat and poorly drained, experiment station tests show. It also thrives better than other vetches on the acid soils of the Willamette valley. It is a good yielder of hay and silage and produces seed of good

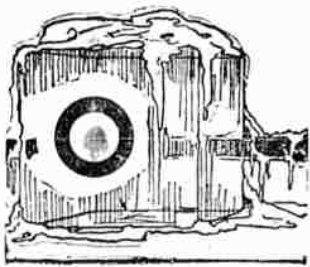
