A new movement in the Oregon poultry industry, hailed as the most important advance in recent years by many breeders, is the organization last week of the Oregon Accredited Hatchery and Breeders association.

The new organization is patterned closely after the one in Washington, operated successfully three years. Its purpose is to protect customers and breeders by providing right supervision of breeding flocks and hatcheries of members.

MURDERER OF 14 PERSONS EAGER TO DIE ON GALLOWS

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 12.—Thomas Johnson, 47, accused slayer of fourteen persons, left here last night for Minneapolis to face charges of killing Leonard Knell, a young railroad attorney, in that city December 19.

"I see some bird down in California has killed a lot of people, too," Johnson remarked on leaving the city jail where he has been since he voluntarily walked into it July 31.

"Stealin' my stuff," he snorted. "Well, it's easy to do—this killing people. But it doesn't get you no place."

"Am I pleased to go back to Minneapolis?" he queried. "Why, it's like walking into heaven to me. I'm delighted. I'll go back and do everything in my power to assist in uncovering the crimes I have perpetrated. I have no fear. I've had more happiness in the last ten days than I've had ever brought me before. For six or seven years my life was a torture, I tell you. Now I feel like I've made amends to my maker. I want to go to the gallows."

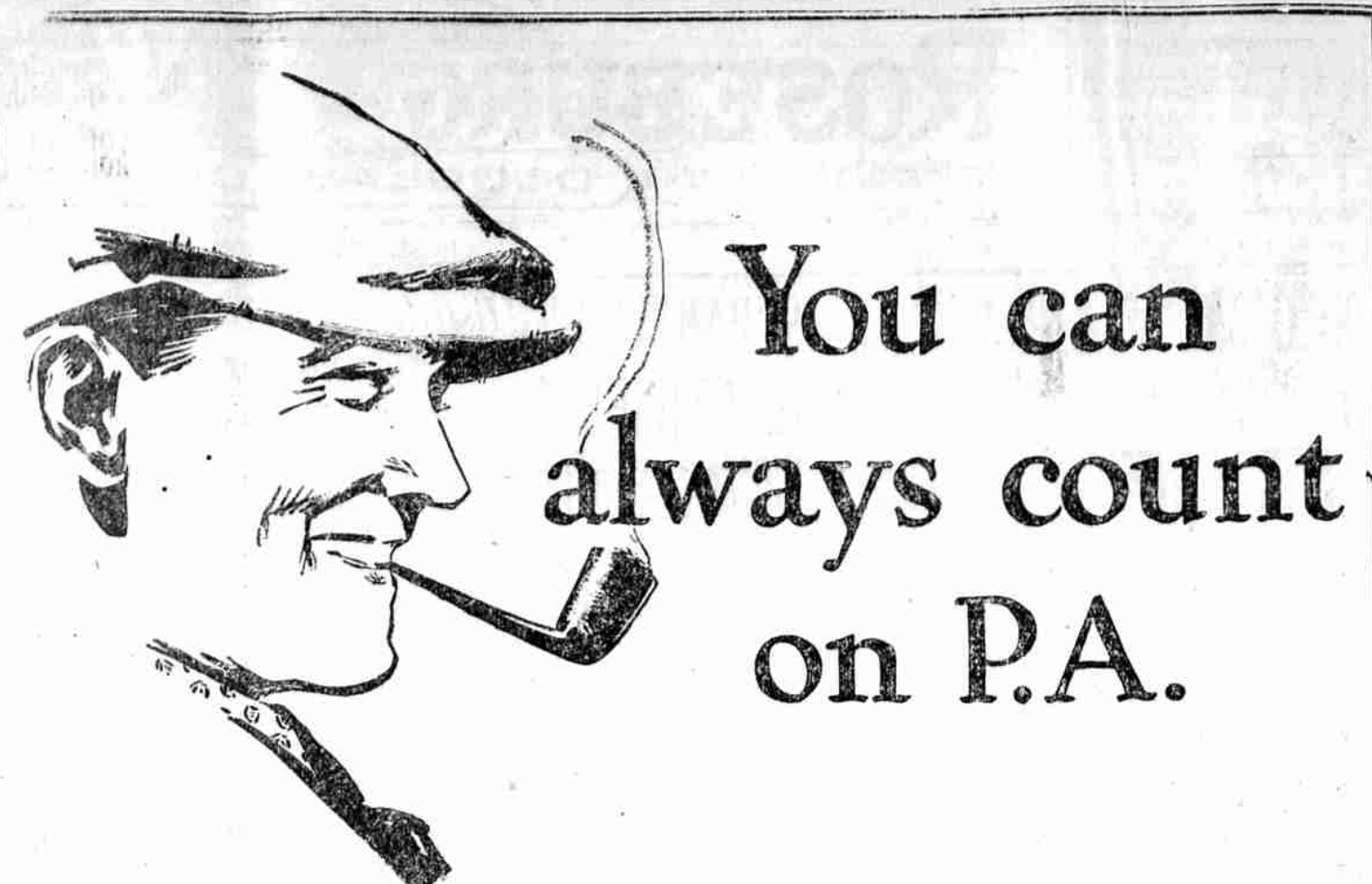

BUILDING CONSTRUCTION IN UNITED STATES SETS NEW HIGH PEAK RECORD

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—All records for volume of construction in the United States were shattered in July. Never before was so much money expended in a single month for labor, materials and other elements entering into building costs, according to statistics compiled by the Associated General Contractors of America.

The volume of construction handled last month was well above that recorded for August, 1925, when the previous "peak" was reached. The index on construction operations, based on the 1913 average, shows a jump from the March level of 120 points to the present position of 225. This is the greatest increase within a four-month period ever recorded.
