GANGSTERS RIDE CHICAGO STREETS TO GIVE BATTLE

CHICAGO, Aug. 12.—A state of open and indiscriminate warfare in gangland was recognized today by the police.

Information to headquarters through underworld contacts told of a war to the finish among the clans engaged in illicit liquor traffic, with old alliances thrown to the winds. Officials predicted that additions to the toll of gangster killings were imminent, possibly on a wholesale scale if the armed carloads of men which cruised sections of Chicago last night should meet.

The authorities, seeking to prevent clashes, vainly hunted for the principals in the latest street battles, particularly Sam "The Greener" Jacobson, and Hymie Weiss, Jacobson, known to police as an aide of Louis "Big" Smith, has eluded arrest since the fatal shooting of Smith Tuesday night.

Detectives regarded the Mitchell avenue pistol battle in which Vincent Drucel repulsed a rival gang, as the overt act which signified the severance of old alliances among the cliques struggling for "Alky Racket" control.

POISONED BOOZE BLAMED FOR THREE DEATHS IN CANADA

SUDBURY, Ont., Aug. 12.—Three deaths in this district during the past few days have caused provincial police to begin an investigation of reports that they were caused by drinking liquor believed to contain wood alcohol.

Two of the dead, Mr. and Mrs. George Carey, are said to have been stricken from drinking liquor given Mr. Carey by a group of tourists from Buffalo, N. Y., as a bonus for acting as their cook on a fishing trip. Four other persons, relatives of the Careys, are said to be ill from drinking from the same bottle.

Neill McGuinness who died here Saturday night, was reported to have said he had drunk some bad liquor.

CANYON CREEK FIRE IS STILL GIVING TROUBLE

The forest fire situation in the county today was very good. All fires were reported under control except the one in Canyon creek where additional forces are expected to halt the blaze by tonight. In order to prevent spoiling the beauty of the highway at Pioneer bridge, where the fire is burning, the fire has been headed up the hill, away from the road. Telephone crews are aiding the county patrol and conditions are such that it is believed further spread can be prevented after tonight. The blaze now covers about 300 acres.

Weather conditions in the northern and western parts of the county have been very favorable. The nights have been cool and the mornings foggy, which keeps fires burning slowly, and prevents new ones from getting a good start.

It is quite a peculiar circumstance, however, that the southern part of the county is still having warm, dry nights, making it more difficult to handle the fires.

Jackson County Situation.
MEDFORD, Ore., Aug. 12.—All forest fires in Jackson county timber were still burning today with more fire fighters being rushed to the flaming fronts. A report to the state forestry office this morning said that the Evans Creek fire, started by incendiaries, had swept into the Sardinia Creek area and threatened virgin timber. The Evans Creek fire has traveled ten miles since it started two weeks ago.

The fire in the timber holdings of the Owen-Oregon company in the Butte Falls district, was reported by mill officials as being under control. It raged in a heavy stand of timber.

The Fish Lake fire is still out of control but is not gaining, owing to the cool night.

Sparks from a threshing machine on Arthur Klenhammer's ranch, in the Applegate valley yesterday afternoon started a fire that destroyed 1800 bushels of wheat and a barn full of hay. The loss is partially covered by insurance.

HEAT DEMORALIZES NATIONAL CAPITAL.

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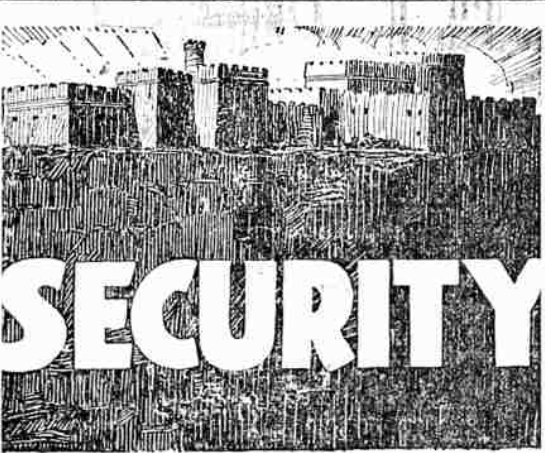

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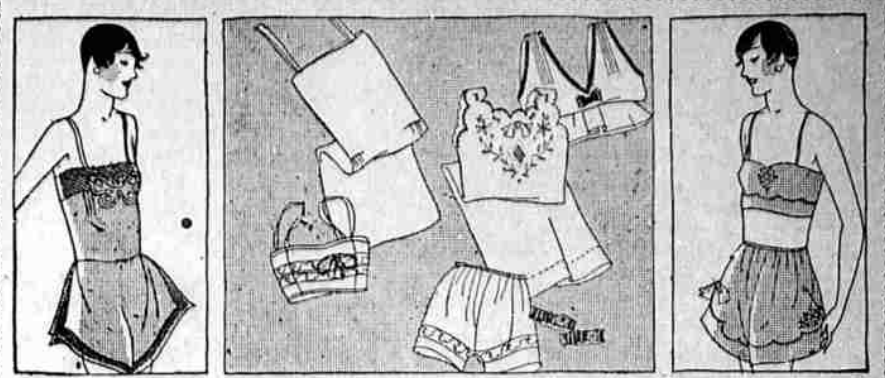
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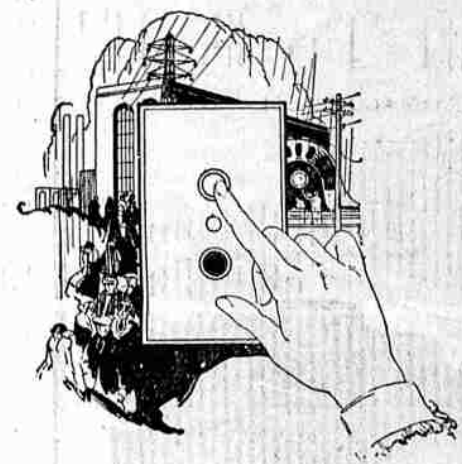
