The Douglas County Concert Band Will Open the Umpqua Park Club House With a Big

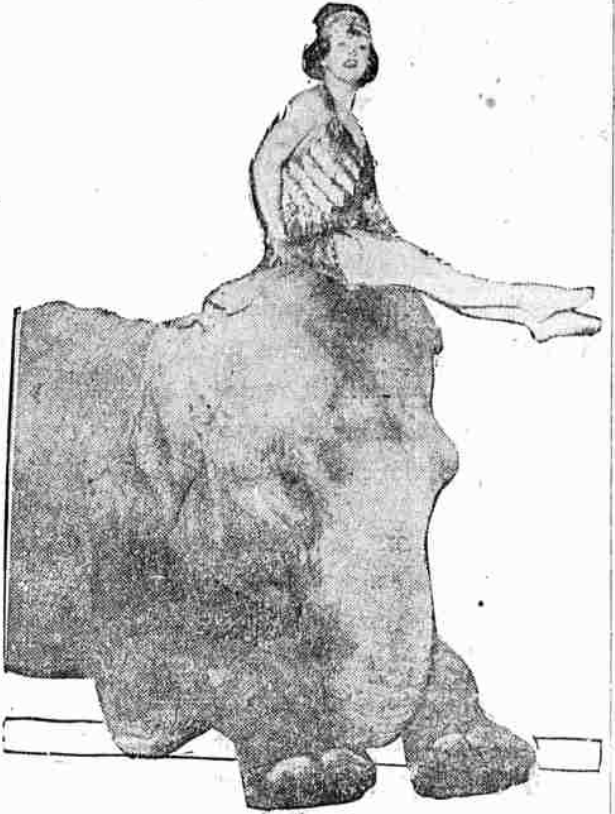

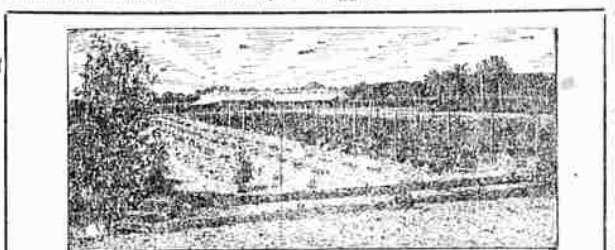
DETROIT, Mich., Aug. 12.—Two men were shot to death and three persons wounded, one of them a woman, in a pistol fight in a downtown cafe here early today. WETS AND DRIES ARE ALIGNED BY RESULT IN OHIO

Pomerene, Liberal, Will Be Opposed by Willis in Race for Senate.

INCUMBENT IS DRY

Klan Endorse in Alabama to Succeed Underwood—Gov. of Arkansas Likely Beaten.

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

CHICAGO, Aug. 12.—Ohio may become the battle ground of another wet and dry political fight this fall as a result of the primary victory of former Senator Alton Pomerene, Democratic nominee for the United States senate.

Pomerene, long regarded as a liberal, defeated his anti-liquor league endorsed opponent, Miss Florence E. Allen, Ohio, supreme court justice, by a good margin in Tuesday's primary, and now stands ready to campaign against his Republican opponent, Senator Frank R. Willis.

That Willis will force the wet and dry issue in Pomerene's race is regarded as likely by political leaders, inasmuch as Willis had anti-liquor league backing in the primary.

Pomerene after serving 12 years as an Ohio senator was defeated in 1922 by Senator S. D. Fess in the Republican primary.

Governor A. V. Borman, nominated by Ohio Democrats for a third term, will be opposed by Attorney Y. Cooper, Cincinnati business man.

Votes were still being tabulated today in the Alabama and Arkansas Democratic primaries.

Hugo L. Black of Birmingham, Ala., Ku Klux Klan endorsed candidate for the seat of U. S. Senator Underwood, who retired in 1927, leads his opponent, John H. Bankhead, by 15,000 votes. Bankhead has been the favorite to succeed Underwood.

Governor Tom Terrell of Arkansas was trailing John E. Marshall, judge of Pulaski chancery court, for the gubernatorial nomination in Arkansas by more than 12,000 votes with approximately two-thirds of the precincts in the state heard from.

"Fergusonism" vs. Klan. DALLAS, Texas, Aug. 12.—The second Texas primary campaign for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination named headway today as Governor Miriam A. Ferguson mobilized her followers on an anti Ku Klux Klan platform in her attempt to defeat Attorney General Dan Moody. The governor's platform is virtually the same as that on which she rode to victory two years ago.

Branding the July ballot, in which Moody led her by a wide margin, as a letting Ku Klux Klan primary, Mrs. Ferguson has entered the runoff contest in direct reversal of plans under which she said she would withdraw from the race and resign from office this fall. Her action throws the state into a campaign of total election status as the Democratic nomination is tantamount to election.

Leaders of the Moody faction have been invited to a mass meeting here Saturday to complete preparations for a statewide drive in which the attorney general declares he will spend speakers to every school district to discuss "Fergusonism."

In a statement yesterday, Governor Ferguson announced she would remain in office until her term expires in January. Referring to her offer to withdraw if Moody led her in the July voting, she declared she was not bound to this because the attorney general failed to accept the proposition. Moody charged the statement was prepared by James E. Ferguson, the governor's husband.

INDIAN MAID GETS BID TO NATIONAL BEAUTY PAGEANT

STOKANE, Aug. 12.—Jewett Jewison, Okanagan Indian maiden, selected as "Princess America" at the recent Indian congress here today was the recipient of an invitation to be guest of honor at the Atlantic City beauty pageant next month. She was not asked how-

ever, to compete with bathing girls representatives from over the country for the honor of becoming "Miss America."

While Jessie's parents expressed their willingness for her to make the trip to Atlantic City, the Indian beauty herself could not be reached. She was out in the Okanagan hills near her home at Okan, Washington, picking nuckleberries.

Officials of the Indian congress expect she will accept and make arrangements to secure a chaperone to send with her. Jessie, a full blood Indian, is the daughter of Chief Long Jim of the Okanagan. She is a high school student.

MRS. VANDERBILT RECOVERS PART OF STOLEN JEWELRY

NEWPORT, R. I., Aug. 12.—Private detectives joined with servants of the Vanderbilt estate, the Breakers, here today in search for the third of three jewelry boxes, mysteriously stolen in a reported \$100,000 robbery which occurred during a dinner party last Saturday.

Two of the boxes were returned to Mrs. Cornelius Vanderbilt, wife of Brig. General Vanderbilt, yesterday, by Louis Chantler, a gardener's helper on the adjoining estate of Mrs. Hamilton McK. Twombly. Chantler found the boxes and their contents under a bush just across the line from the Vanderbilt estate.

The third box was believed to contain the most valuable of the missing gems.

There were more than 50 guests at the dinner which was given by Mrs. Vanderbilt and her daughter, Grace.

COMMUNITIES MUST TAKE LEAD IN PREVENTION

Forest Fire Situation Demands Cooperation of All Residents.

EDUCATION NEEDED

Value of Timber as Potential Resource Must Be Impressed Upon the Minds of All.

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

R. H. Chapter, manager of the Western Forestry and Conservation association, and Porter King, inspector from the State Forestry office, arrived in Roseburg today to check over the fire situation in Douglas county.

The association represented by Mr. Chapter is composed of all of the smaller organizations of the states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana, being an association of all these state units for the purpose of conserving the timber wealth of the northwest.

"Fire prevention," Mr. Chapter said today, "can only be a success when communities show sufficient interest to give the proper cooperation. Until such time as communities realize the value of fire prevention and determine that there shall be no more fires of incendiary origin, we will continue to have trouble."

"Our task is now educational. Residents of the outlying districts in many instances are believers in the 'light burning method.' They think that the forest should be burned over every year to keep out undergrowth. This system has been tried extensively in experiments made throughout the country, and it probably would work if it could be controlled, but the cost of systematic burning is prohibitive. It costs far more to practice systematic burning than it does to patrol and the timber owners cannot afford the burning method, even though it did not cause losses to their holdings."

"Another factor, peculiar to Douglas county, is that the older residents have little realization of the value of the timber. They have lived in the county for years and have seen no development of the timber resources. Timber to them is cheap, it has no value, while stock is a profitable industry. Consequently they do not impart to their children any knowledge of the value of timber, so that little interest is shown in destroying fires."

"Despite this fact, however, we realize that there are few people who will deliberately set fire to timber lands. The vicious, vandal element is a decided minority in any community. The condition does prevail, however, that there are many who are in sympathy with law and order, and although they will not participate in the actual crime, they will not betray the incendiary."

"Before incendiary fires are stopped the communities must decide that timber has a worthwhile value, and that it should not be purposely burned off. It must be recognized by its true status, as of timber, potential wealth, as much as any other property, and saved from fire as any home, barn or improved property. When the community realizes that point it will be willing to give cooperation in fire prevention, and incendiary fires will be a thing of the past."

Mr. Chapter says that the association is preparing a series of motion pictures to be used in public tours throughout the state, and it is expected that these will prove of great benefit as an educational measure.

GIRL COMPANIONS OF ARRESTED PAIR GET THEIR LIBERTY

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 12.—Police today released Michael Johnson and Bernice Ann Brown, companions of Ralph Kearney and Albert Davis, alleged Chicago robbers. Federal officials said they would not press charges against the two men for harboring the girls, who were arrested last Friday at an auto camp where they had been left. They were merely detained by police and were not under arrest.

"Message Sticks" Open Books to Aborigines

One of the mysteries of the aboriginal of Australia is the case with which he reads "message-sticks" regardless of whether they have been written by one of his own tribesmen or a member of a distant tribe with which he has never come into contact.

The signs and symbols apparently are the same among the aboriginal tribes, according to a writer in the Sydney Bulletin, who asserts that he has "seen an old aboriginal, to whom a stick from another tribe many miles distant had been shown, translate the strange markings with fluency, and when some time afterward the same stick was shown again to another native, the second one's translation agreed with that of the first."

A few white men have learned to decipher the conventional markings and symbols on the "message-sticks."

Fox Fires No Longer Cause Childish Fear

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Creation of Mankind Flattering to Indians

"He molded another form and laid it in the hot ashes, but when he drew it out it was blackened and crisp. So he tossed it to one side. Then he molded a new figure, even more carefully than before, packed the red coals around it, and when he lifted it from the fire it was red and sound and perfect."
