PORTLAND, Aug. 13.—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow: "Business in the wool markets of this country has been quiet this past week, but prices are steadily maintained. Further opening of goods by the American Woolen company comprising fancy wools and women's wear have been made at about the same basis established for men's staple lines a month ago and appear to be attracting considerable attention. Mohair is in moderate request and firm." The following quotations will appear in the Commercial Bulletin: Oregon-Eastern fine staple \$1.10; fine and medium clothing 99-95; best combing 65-70; best carding 59-55c.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 13.—Oregon's prolonged drought is being seriously felt in the dairy industry with resulting advances in butter, eggs and cheese values. Fed-up pastures and springs have curtailed production and made increased feeding necessary until a month earlier than during normal seasons. Cheese prices were lifted again today following the announcement of another cent advance in Philadelphia.
