PORTLAND MAN IS HURLED THRU AUTO TOP AND KILLED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Aug. 12.—W. L. Clinton, 63, for 23 years an employe of the Honeymoon Hardware company of Portland, was killed late yesterday afternoon when a sedan driven by Mrs. H. L. Fleming, 625 East Couch street, Portland, turned over in loose gravel on the highway 55 miles north of here.

Mrs. Fleming with Mrs. A. M. Griley, 401 East 38th street, Portland, and Mrs. Clinton, were only slightly cut and bruised. Mrs. Clinton is prostrated with grief. The party was returning to Portland on the Dalles-California highway following a visit at Crater Lake, intending to spend the night in La Pine, 120 miles north of this city.

A blowout caused the car to swerve into loose gravel and Mrs. Fleming's sudden application of the brakes caused the car to turn completely over. Clinton was thrown through the top, portions of which penetrated his skull. He did not regain consciousness following the accident. Some of the women are suffering from more than superficial injuries, more than physicians in attendance.
