## The Bathing Season Opens With Smart Accessories

The Surf Is Bright With Colorful Jerseys, While Gay Prints Dot the Beaches. Chic Ensembles Include Matching Cape, Cap, Parasol, Bag and Slippers



With the beach as a brilliant background, bathing costumes in vivid tones are particularly effective. Bright jersey suits for the energetic swimmer, gay prints, vivid damasks, rubberized chintzes and moire suits in bright shades are to be found dotting the sands in colorful fashion.

There is a decided flair for matching accessories this season, and the very smartest outfit boasts a cape or coat to harmonize with the suit and also bags, slippers and parasols.

The color may be the keynote to the matching ensemble. A wool combination, for instance, of purple is smartly covered by a suit of flowered silk or damask and boasts a cape which matches and flaunts a gay cap of the silk banded in the shade of the woolen combination. A hat may be of the plain tone in rubberized moire, while sunshade and slippers may be of the printed silk or in the plain purple. It is in the general ensemble effect that the smartness of the bathing costume is judged.

The ensemble effect is as important on the beach as it is on the street. Beach life has now become of vital importance in the summer season, and bathing chic is to be found in costumes which strike an ensemble effect in all the harmonizing details.

There is a distinct "dress" type of bathing costume which features a slip of plain or printed silk with a decided fullness below the hips, worn over a woolen combination, or trunks in harmonizing shade.

The petal skirt which is so popular for the semi-formal afternoon frock is reflected in the very smart taffeta bathing suits which feature a scalloped skirt. All black or vivid tones are smartest in the plain taffetas.

Polka dots, stripes, flowered patterns, chintz designs and geometrical patterns all lend chic to the silk suit which strikes a formal effect.

The energetic swimmer finds the one-piece suit the most acceptable costume, or, in seeking something newer, wears the suit which includes a jumper of white or striped jersey and trunks of the plain jersey. An extremely smart ensemble for the bath who prefers this type of suit combines a flannel coat and trousers to match, with a contrasting jersey top. The newest coats and trunks are of striped or plaid flannel.

Shawls and blankets are very new as beach coverings and are as

smart as the capes, which have always, and still remains, popular. Rubberized crepe silks are seen in shawls of very formal aspect and are frequently heavily fringed and graceful in outline. The gaily striped flannel in coat effect is the smart covering for the one-piece suit.

Bathing caps in bandanna or wrapped turban effects are worn with chic results. They should always harmonize, if not match, the bathing costume itself. The large hat of straw, which shades the face, may be worn on the beach itself by women who wish to avoid the glare of the sun and its effects.

Parasols, however, achieve this absence from sunburn more smartly. The most popular parasols match the accessories of the bathing hour and may be found in striped or printed linen, rubberized silks, panna or crocheted straw or in plain and vivid toned cottons and silks.

Rubber sandals to match the color or note of the costume are the smartest covering for the foot. Pannams, too, are seen in bright colors and may be worn into the water.

Bags of rubberized silks to match the printed bathing fabric are found adding a note of bathing chic, while plain tones in rubberized moire in harmonizing shades are to be desired also.

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### HOW TO DETECT REAL LINEN

A Valuable Hint for the Housewife

In this day of cleverly executed substitutes for real linen, even to the imposition of the fine gloss which is characteristic of fine linen on damasks, there is one infallible test by which real linen may be detected from other fabrics.

In order to be certain of your cloth, remove a thread from the fabric, hold one end upright, wet it and tauten with the fingers. As it dries you may know it is linen if it revolves anti-clockwise. Another test may be made by putting a few drops of water on the cloth. If it soaks through quickly, it is linen.
