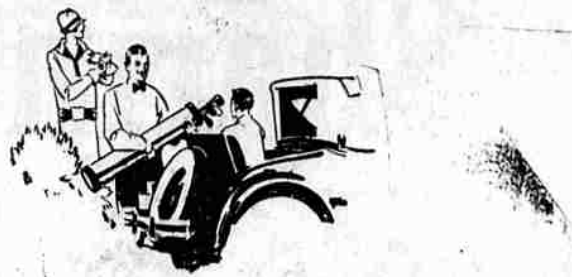


Smart New Rumble Seat For Sport Roadster

fire on Brush creek will be out tonight, it is believed.

The string of fires on Lavandore creek are still burning, but fire lines have been thrown around the greater part so that it will soon be controlled, it is thought.

The Wagner creek fire on the Coast Range is burning over about 100 acres. A crew sufficient to handle it, however, has been sent in.

M. E. Slack, of the county patrol, made a flight over the county yesterday, being in the air for two hours and a half. Every fire was circled, the observer finding where old fires in one or two instances had burned across the fire lines. Men were sent in and threw new trenches around the fires. Yesterday was quite clear, so that fine observations were secured.

Low humidity has caused the fires to spread with great rapidity, but this condition was slightly improved today.

Logging Crews Battle LA GRANDE, Aug. 16.—Two serious forest fires, one near Maxville, in Wallowa county, and one in the Wolf Creek district, near North Powder, are reported to be gaining headway. Meagre details are available here. Logging crews are combating the Maxville flames in Bowman-Hicks Lumber company timber and logging crews, reinforced by Baker and North Powder men, are fighting the Wolf Creek fire.

Hilt Has Close Call.
HILT, Calif., Aug. 16.—A forest fire seriously threatened this community of about 200 persons last night.

With the male population out fighting the blaze the women and children gathered on the northern edge of the town.

The fire started Saturday at White Point, Oregon, near the summit of the Siskiyou mountains. It burned an area six miles long and two miles wide.

Deschutes Situation.
BEND, Ore., Aug. 16.—All forest fires in this vicinity were reported trenched today and were expected to be under control tonight unless high winds should spread them across the fire lines.

The fire on the Metolius river was the worst today, but it was trenched. The Fort Rock fire was in good shape. No word was received up to noon from the Calus lake fire, but reports last night indicated it was being held.

Flames Sweep Ranch.
