BRIEF SPORT NEWS

Where Smith's Style Wins
McDonald Smith, one of the greatest stylists and shot-makers in professional golf, has a "stop-and-listen" method of putting, but it usually gets results. "Mac" takes the utmost of his native Scotch caution with every stroke on the greens, examining contours, feeling the resiliency of the soil, sighting his ball fore and aft, then making a final tour of inspection to eliminate all stray obstacles, no matter how minute.

An excellent illustration of the effectiveness of his putting methods was furnished by Smith in carrying off the metropolitan open golf title in a third play-off round with Gene Sarzan. Sarzan, the defending champion, shot a 70, and was three under par with a card good enough to win nine out of ten matches. But Smith's uncanny work on the greens gave him a record-breaking 58 and the crown. Mac's magic wand was an aluminum putter of the Schenectady type, and with it he was finding the hole from distances of forty feet as easily as he did from four.

In the catalog of golf's outstanding scoring feats of 1926, Smith's 68 at Salisbury and his average of 70.47 for the seven rounds necessary to decide the metropolitan tournament are ranked by critics

on the same plane with Bobby Jones' 134 in the British open qualifying play and Walter Hagen's record-breaking 132 for the first two rounds of the eastern open championship.

Paid For Delaney Match
Jack Delaney, the new world's light heavyweight champion, now is one of the greatest drawing cards New York rings have ever known. But it was only a little more than three years ago that his manager had to pay \$1,000 for the privilege of gaining a title here. Pete Reilly, the title-holder's manager, tells of his experience in matching Delaney for his first metropolitan fight on February 6, 1923, with the veteran Augie Ratner at the Commonwealth Sporting club in Harlem.

"When Jack first came down to New York he was unknown," said Reilly. "I endeavored to sign him up at Madison Square Garden but I met the cry 'Who ever heard of Jack Delaney?'
"Jong McMahon was then match-maker at the Commonwealth and I guaranteed Delaney would draw \$3,000 if he would give him a match. He signed Jack with Ratner for six rounds for \$600 and I personally bought \$1,000 worth of tickets and gave them away to my friends.

"Jack outpointed Ratner and drew in excess of the \$3,000 and ever since Delaney has been a big drawing card in New York."

DRAGER COMPANY PRUNE WAREHOUSE IS UNDER LICENSE

Prune Growers to Obtain
Benefit From Establishment
of Government
Regulated Storage

Mr. C. F. Huffman, U. S. Warehouse examiner was in Roseburg Saturday, auditing the affairs of the Drager Fruit Co., Inc., who are to be licensed under the United States Warehouse Act. This company has leased the value of the service it might render growers in this vicinity by storing their dried prunes under the provisions of this law. "Although the United States Warehouse Act," said Mr. Huffman, "is a comparatively recent enactment, growers as well as warehousemen in ever increasing numbers are beginning to appreciate the advantages which may accrue to them through the operation of the Federal warehouse law. "One of the principal purposes of the warehouse law," said Mr. Huffman, "is to convert stored agricultural products into suitable collateral for financing purposes. This once accomplished, Congress felt the necessity for dumping at harvest time would soon pass." Mr. Huffman explained that it is now possible for growers to take their dried prunes to a licensed warehouse and receive a federally licensed warehouse receipt therefor on which the grower can usually borrow a reasonable portion of its value at the local bank. This type of security which has helped the vigilant supervision of the Federal Government is particularly desirable to the local banker, because the banker knows that if it becomes necessary he can easily discount notes supported with such receipts with correspondent banks, The Federal Reserve Banks or the Intermediate Credit Banks.

Mr. Huffman pointed out that Secretary of Agriculture J. H. Clegg recently said: "One of the greatest problems which has ever faced American agriculture has resulted from dumping large volumes of farm products on the market during the first few months after harvest. Such a practice has resulted in glut and periods of low prices. We have done a lot of talking about orderly marketing in years past, but it has only been of more recent date that real progress has been made. We recognized that a flow of farm products in keeping with consumptive demand was essential, but factors presented themselves to make this difficult. We had no way of advancing to farmers a proportion of the price for their products, which might be stored and kept off the market. The United States Warehouse Act gives farmers of this country a handy vehicle to use in bringing about a more even distribution of their products."

"Many dealers and operators are making use of the law, as it also assists them in financing their business," said Mr. Huffman. "Public Warehouse men are not compelled to operate under the Federal Warehouse Act," explained Mr. Huffman, "any warehouseman may apply for license, but under the law the Secretary of Agriculture is obliged to select with care and to admit to the system only such warehousemen as he feels will make acceptable licensees under the law. It is only through licensing the better class of warehousemen and careful supervision of their operations that confidence can be maintained in the warehouse receipts issued by Federally licensed warehousemen and this confidence is absolutely necessary if the banking fraternity of the United States is to continue to hold this type of collateral in such esteem." "The Federal Warehouse system," according to Mr. Huffman, is operated somewhat similarly to the national banking system. After a warehouseman is accepted into the system, his properties are subjected to examination by Federal warehouse examiners from three to four times each year. Careful inventories are made of the stocks on hand and utmost care is exercised to make certain that the goods covered by Federal warehouse receipts are in proper condition for storage at all times.

Mr. Huffman was firm in his belief that the growers of prunes in this county would use the licensed facilities to an increasing extent, as they become better acquainted with the advantages afforded under the system. Hundreds of millions of dollars are now being loaned on the basis of farm products covered by Federal warehouse receipts, and the Government feels that as the growers and dealers become better acquainted with the purpose of the warehouse Act, tight money conditions will be greatly eased at critical periods for the farmer.

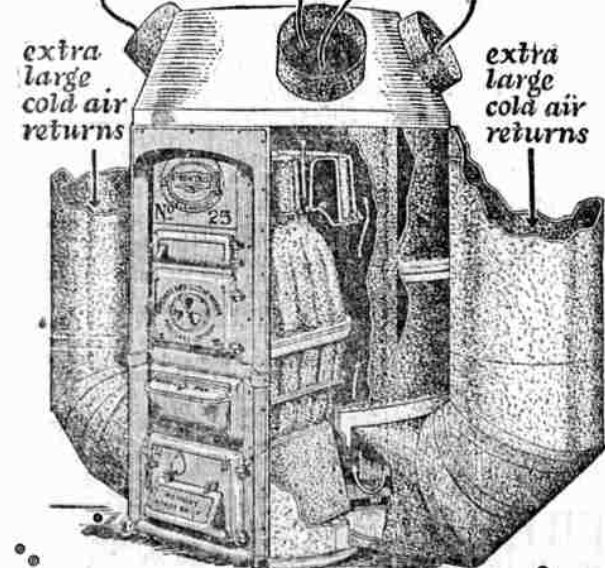
