MAZER DENIES HE SLEW EDITOR, BUT STATE GETS CLOSE

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Aug. 17.—Louis Mazer, charged with the murder of Don R. Melett, Canton publisher, late today admitted to the investigators questioning him at the federal building that he was in the vicinity of the Melett home near the time of the murder.

After a breakdown before the direct accusation by District Attorney A. Bernsteen, Mazer stiffened and stoutly denied any knowledge

of the crime.

"It's a lie, I did not do it," Mazer shouted over and over again.

When Carl Studer, another Canton underworld leader, was brought before the accused man, Mazer appeared startled. He did not know his former partner in the ownership of a Canton pool room was being detained.

Both Studer and Mazer spent the night in the Cuyahoga county jail formally charged with conspiracy to violate the federal prohibition act.

"Studer knows I didn't do it," Mazer protested.

Bernsteen pounced upon the statement.

"Then Studer must know who did it," he cried.

Studer joined in the shouted protests and denied any knowledge of the crime.

SPECIAL RADIO PROGRAMS AGAIN TO GO TO ARCTIC

HASTINGS, Neb., Aug. 17.—(A. P.)—Radio again will play a leading role in breaking the dull monotony of cold, bitter nights in the Arctic Circle posts.

So satisfactory were the special experimental "Arctic Circle" broadcasts by radio station KFKX, Hastings, and other stations last winter, that special programs have been arranged for the coming winter months. The best equipment already has been dispatched to the various circle posts to insure proper reception.

KFKX special programs will be broadcast for Arctic circle posts on November 19, December 24, January and February 25. These programs will be radioed on a 28.5 meters wave length and will start at 9 p. m. central standard time, each program lasting about four hours.

It that night and that at the time of the tragedy it stood fifty yards from where Miss Gaines was beaten and choked to death.

Gaines swore that about a week before Miss Gaines was slain, he and she stopped at about that place and purchased ice cream sodas while returning from a drive.

Explaining stains of blood on a shirt of his, the defendant told the jury he had cut his thumb and that he kept cigarettes in a pocket near which the marks occurred.

The witness admitted that from the time he entered the army in the World war until that of his daughter's death he drank heavily, but he declared himself a light drinker before his military service.

THREE MEN SLAIN IN MINE BATTLE; KILLER IN JAIL

MERCED, Calif., Aug. 17.—Three men are dead and a fourth in jail as a result of a shooting affray at a mining claim in Mariposa county yesterday. Paul Baran, 50 year old prospector, who shot down his three companions, surrendered to Sheriff T. A. Mack here last evening, claiming self defense.

The third victim, Theodore Shastner of Oakland, died at the scene of the shooting last night. The other two, Victor Shimonoleff also of Oakland, and Harry Clark of Danney, N. C., were dead when Mariposa county officials arrived yesterday.

According to District Attorney Louis Milburn of Mariposa county, Shastner was able to make no statement concerning the affair beyond gasping "Paul Baran did the shooting."

Shastner was attended by the physician from the Diosa prison road camp.

Shastner and Shimonoleff, mining students at the University of California, lived at the cabin of Clark and his wife, about a mile from Baran's claim and cabin. They were working on shares Baran's gold mine, which he told officers was worth \$80,000.

After the shooting Baran took a train to Merced and calmly surrendered to the local sheriff, saying that the three men were planning to drive him off his property and that he shot them and gave himself up here because he "could not get justice in Mariposa."

According to District Attorney Milburn only one weapon was found at the scene of the shooting. This was a rifle, emptied of shells

and broken across a rock. Its ownership was not established.

DESIGNS AIRPLANE MORE DIFFICULT TO "CRACK UP"

DAYTON, O., Aug. 16.—An airplane that will be harder to "crack up" than most of those now flying has been designed by D. E. Dunlap, aeronautical engineer, and soon will be ready for test flights.

Two of the fruitful causes of trouble when an airplane goes into a nose-dive are the propeller and heavy power plant, which often are forced back upon the pilot, in jarring or killing him.

Dunlap's ship will have two motors placed between the wings and at the sides and back of the pilot and his companion. They are "pushers" with the propellers in the rear. This eliminates dirt from the engine, and the terrific noise, and gives passengers a clear view directly ahead.

Of more importance, it permits the ship to be built with a blunt metal nose. When it comes down on its nose, it will simply "nose over," Dunlap says.

The ship will be amphibian, with both land and water landing gears, which in later models will be arranged so that they may be switched by the pilot from his cockpit while flying. The landing gear also will be equipped with a brake, and will be able to land and take off in twice its own length.

Following the trial flights it will be put into commercial production.
