STORM INFLECTS HEAVY DAMAGE IN LONG ISLAND COVE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

NEW YORK, Aug. 17.—(Residents on both sides of Manhattan Island today were clearing up the debris caused by a freak storm that last night swept the Long Island and New Jersey shores, causing extensive property damage.

At Glen Cove, Long Island, cottages were wrecked, tents unroofed, trees uprooted and wire communications broken when a waterspout swept in from Long Island sound. Early reports said two men were killed but later it was learned they had been extricated without harm from their wrecked cottage. Property damage was estimated at \$175,000.

Estimated as high as \$150,000. Two racing sloops of the New York Yacht club were caught by the spout in Glen Cove harbor and one was capsized. Amid the whirling of the wind and the swirl of water could be heard fire and burglar alarms set off by the crowding of electric wires.

More than \$500,000 damage was done two hours earlier in Bergen county, New Jersey, just across the Hudson river from New York. A church, four houses and a garage were wrecked in Ridgefield park. Police and fire departments were called out to clear the streets. A bank building, a public waiting room for bus passengers, an office building and the plant of a lumber company were badly damaged.

JORDAN VALLEY'S TRUSTEE OFFERS TO CANCEL SUIT

Files Stipulation Based on Delivery of Notes and Mortgages to U. S. Court.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 17.—T. H. Wegener, trustee in bankruptcy for the Jordan Valley Farm company, Monday submitted a stipulation to the desert land board in which he offered to withdraw his suit for damages in the amount of \$250,000. The action followed the transfer of notes, mortgages and other records alleged to the property of the farm company by Rhea Luper, state engineer, to the United States district court of Idaho. Wegener charged that the land board had refused to surrender the notes and mortgages and that he had been damaged in the sum of \$250,000. The desert land board claimed that it was never in possession of the records and other property involved in the suit, but that these were entrusted to Charles A. Strickland, assistant state engineer by J. L. McAllister, acting as Wegener's agent.

Would Cancel Notes.

It was understood that the papers would not be delivered to any other than the Jordan Valley Irrigation district. The notes were given by the settlers of the district for the water right. The company was forced into bankruptcy before the water was delivered and it is now proposed that the notes be cancelled.

Members of the desert land board in a statement said that the records were withheld to prevent their falling into the hands of unscrupulous persons who might cause trouble. They made it plain that the notes and mortgages were turned over to the federal court in Boise with the understanding that they would not be sold for the benefit of the creditors. Wegener, over the protest of the creditors' attorney, agreed to dismiss the suit.

These members of the desert land board were defendants in the suit.

Bend Dispute Adjusted.

A stipulation decrees in a condemnation suit brought by the city of Bend against the Tumalo Irrigation district was approved by the desert land board Monday. The tentative stipulation provides that the Tumalo Irrigation district shall furnish the city of Bend six second feet of water from Tumalo creek in return for \$5 second foot of water from the Deschutes river and \$25,000. The water must be used by Bend for municipal purposes.

Canal Co. Remiss.

The Medford Irrigation district has applied to State Engineer Luper for approval of a resolution adopted by the district for the cancellation of a contract with the Rogue River Canal company for the construction of an irrigation district. It is charged by the petitioners that the canal company has failed to comply with the provisions of the contract and authority to complete the district is now sought.

Better Lights Proposed

A. H. Crowell, who is in charge of the maintenance of the city street lights, appeared before the council and suggested that the lamp bulbs now in use be replaced. He explained that the lamps in use are of special design, their action being such that carbon discharged from the filament sticks to the glass of which the globe is composed, leaving them blackened so that the street lights do not give the proper efficiency. He proposed that now lamps be installed at once. The old ones have been burning long beyond the time guaranteed for efficient service, he stated. The matter was referred to the committee on electric lights.

A complaint from residents of West Mosher street, that a sewer there overflows into basements in the wet season, and should be repaired before the fall rains start, was referred to the city engineer for investigation.

A petition from O. J. Rand that sidewalk be ordered constructed on the east side of Hamilton street south of Rice street, was referred to the street committee.

The street committee reported favorably on the petition of O. J. Pargeter for the paving of Claire street, and the city engineer was ordered to prepare plans and specifications.

The engineer submitted plans for the proposed drainage system at the intersection of Jackson street, 2nd avenue south and Winchester street. Large drains will be laid across Jackson and Winchester streets, draining all the area around the intersection. The intersection is the low point in that district, and the greater part of the water from all of North Roseburg collects in front of the

Page Lumber company office. The new drainage system will carry off the water through eight catch basins. The estimated cost is \$1,537.14 which will be assessed against all property in North Roseburg west of the Benson school.

Miss Ederle said the presence of the two tugs made her task more difficult because of the broken water between the vessels.

The drill team and several other members of the hospitality club plan to make the trip to Eugene to attend the celebration, although it will not be possible for the entire membership to participate.

Friday has been designated as hospitality day, but the drum corps competition is on Thursday. The American Legion drum corps, of Umpqua Post, is to compete for the prize, and the Chiefs will make the trip at the same time, so that they may have the benefit of the drum corps music for their street drill.

All grades of cube butter were a cent higher today except firsts. Extras are now posted at 42 cents, standards at 41 cents and prime firsts at 40 cents.

FARM REMINDERS
The price paid Oregon farmers for winter feed is rather uniform says the experiment station, probably because of the general use by the creamerymen of butter price information given in a Portland newspaper. It is the practice of many creameries to pay the same price for butter fat that is paid for print butter in the Portland market. Some creameries pay even a cent or more above this basic price while others may buy the raw product for less.

That the time of picking Oregon prunes, says the experiment station, affords somewhat the solid content of fruit has been common knowledge for some time. In some tests by the station the solid content of prunes on the trees in the Oaco orchards increased from 13.3 to 15.3 between August 10 to 22. Fruit held in storage apparently underwent no material change in solid content.

Volstead Law Creates Knotty Problems For Supreme Court

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—(A. P.)—Controversies arising out of the enforcement of the Volstead act and interpretation of rum treaties now constitute one of the most prolific sources of litigation reaching the supreme court.

The cases pending cover a wide range, from attempts to nullify rum treaties which General Andrews regards as one of the most effective instruments in combating bootlegging, to technical questions in rather ordinary cases.

Seizure of the Canadian steamer "Quadrant" off the Farallone Islands, liquor laden, on the ground that she was within one hour's sailing by her own power of the California coast, will be the basis for testing the jurisdiction of federal courts to try cases alleged to have originated outside the territorial limits of the United States.

Physician's Prescriptions
Dr. Samuel W. Lambert of New York City, with the support of the American Medical Association, has challenged the Volstead act restriction upon physician's prescriptions.

William E. Dodge and others, owners of the "Ray of Black Island," have attacked the right of the federal government to forfeit a boat seized by the Rhode Island police. Automobile companies in Alabama and Washington state are questioning the right of the gov-

attempting to enforce or violate the law when arrested on a docket at which liquor had been landed; whether Joshua E. Russell, former prohibition director for Ohio, was involved in a conspiracy to unlawfully transport and sell liquor in Cleveland and other places; and whether a former prohibition director for Nevada committed an offense punishable under the law when he failed to report to the United States attorney alleged violations near Reno.

There are also on the docket now numerous other liquor cases of minor importance, and a large number of others probably will be filed before the court returns in October.
