an "inside job."

driven on his way from Canada to
California, apparently went off the
grade near Oakland about five days
ago. The man, it is believed, had
died of an illness and had driven
off the grade after being at the
wheel. He had tried to set the
emergency brake of his car, but
it had failed. The car coasted on
the left of the road and went into
the ditch, and came to a stop in
heavy brush, where it was observed
from a distance.

It was found yesterday by two
boys, Arthur Strobel of Milwaukee,
Oregon, and Henry Castle of La
Grande, members of a tourist
party, who reported their gruesome
discovery, the body being brought
to Roseburg.

A card found in the pocket of
the dead man's coat gave the name of
Roy L. Church, who proved to be a
brother. Other relatives were
reached through the Mutual lodge
of Nauvoo, of which the deceased
was a member. He was also asso-
ciated with the Knights of Pythias,
and Eastern Star lodge, and was a
member of the British Columbia
Automobile Club.

Pavements Slippery
Due to the slippery pavements
today there were numerous cases
of cars skidding into the ditch re-
ported. Garages were kept busy re-
pairing broken fenders and minor
damages caused by drivers losing
control of their cars. Many col-
lisions also resulted from this con-
dition. A car driven by Irene C.
Powers of Seattle, collided with a
truckload of watermelons driven
by Sourdough Jim Gray at Rice
Hill this morning. Fortunately no
one was injured and the melons
were not badly damaged.

A collision last night between
cars driven by T. D. Roland and
Earl Pickens at Rose and Lane
streets, caused minor damage to
both cars, although no one was
hurt.

Other collisions during the day
were numerous, although none of
a serious nature were reported up
to a late hour this afternoon.

SON IS ACCUSED AFTER MOTHER AND MAN ARE KILLED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SEATTLE, Aug. 18.—Because
he and his mother, who was killed
yesterday, were accused in two
notes of doing away with Harry
Gilmore, alias Charles E. O'Brien,
witness, last November, Harry
Marrenger was held in jail here
today on an open charge. The notes
were written by Tom H. Seymour,
67, who was found shot to death
yesterday in a hotel beside
the dead body of Mrs. Ada Mar-
renger, 47. Mrs. Marrenger oper-
ated the hotel.

Gilmore's body was found in Lake
Union here. Although there were
bruises on Gilmore's head, and his
automobile was never found, po-
lice decided he had died accident-
ally.

These notes were left by Sey-
mour. In one he said "Mrs. Mar-
renger and her son are the ones
who done away with Harry Gil-
more last November. They are
trying to do away with me. So
I tried to get me to make out my
insurance to her."

REVOLT IN NICARAGUA
(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Aug. 18.—
It is reported here that the
American consul at Bluefields has
requested a gunboat be sent there
on account of persistent rumors
that the revolutionists will attack
the town.

A small band of revolutionists
yesterday attacked the government
force at Quetzalpaque. A town
seven miles distant from Managua
was hit several times. Several
were killed on both sides,
it is said.

hibit which is being arrang-
ed as a part of the celebra-

him, has been fighting often in
various parts of the country, and
is concluding his training in a

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MOUNT HOOD LOOP BRIDGE WRECKED BY RISING WATER

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 18.—
Sudden rise of White river wreck-
ed the bridge across that stream
on the Mount Hood loop on the
southeast side of Mount Hood ear-
ly today. This will block the
scenic drive to traffic until the
structure is rebuilt.

About forty feet of the west end
of the bridge went out and also
about ten feet of the highway on
the west bank of the stream.
Great boulders were sent tum-
bling down the stream by the rush
of water which was caused by

heavy rains.

H. B. Van Duzer, chairman of
the state highway commission,
said it would not take long to re-
pair the bridge, as it is of wooden
construction and was expected to
go out each winter, because of the
changing current of the river
which makes permanent construc-
tion doubtful.

It is expected that the bridge
will be repaired in a few days.
