were searce and the life land was more plentiful in the early days of the West, so much land was available that it was given to the settlers in 640 acre donation claims and granted to the railroads by thousands of square miles as an inducement for building railroads. Later the land grant policy was abandoned, and the net result was that the land was cut down to the 160-acre homestead, a pre-emption of similar area, and 160 acres of timber obtainable after six months' residence thereon for \$2.50 per acre.

A generation ago "rushes" to newly surveyed tracts of government land were frequent and often interesting, but they are no longer in evidence. Government land so plentiful throughout the West a few years ago is no longer obtainable close in to roads and civilization, and with plenty of employment at good wages in the cities where the bright lights shine, there is less incentive for people to venture into the backwoods and take up the homesteader's hardships.

All over the state, however, and especially in the coast counties, hundreds of the rural folk have been reclaimed from the wilderness by the ax of the homesteader. These results of hard work and deprivation are not only fine farms, but coincident with their development was that of a sturdy self-reliant race of good American citizens who made the farms what they are.—Portland Telegram.
