PORTLAND, Aug. 20.—Charles Ramon Sutton, 46, native of Oregon and widely known commercial fisherman and steamboat operator of Rainier, Oregon, died Wednesday at the Port Townsend, Washington, marine hospital. The funeral services will be held at 1:30 o'clock Friday at the R. of P. cemetery.

Born in Polk county March 22, 1880, Mr. Sutton moved to Rainier with his parents in 1888. He spent the greater part of his life there, engaged in commercial fishing and steamboat operating. The last four years he had been employed by the Columbia Contract company as master of its boat, Crick.

He is survived by his wife, Gertrude; a daughter, Helen Sutton; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Sutton of Roseburg, and two sisters, Mrs. B. Kinney and Mrs. Iva Jones, both of Portland.

(Associated Press Local Wire.) COLUMBUS, Ohio, Aug. 20.—With the death toll in Ohio due to floods, in the past two days, standing at five, and with thousands of acres of the state's finest corn land and a number of highways under water, rain was again forecast today.

NO PRUNE PRICE FOR OREGON UNTIL NEXT WEEK—GILE

SALEM, Aug. 20.—The California prune prices just announced are considerably lower than was expected according to H. S. Gile, no effort has yet been noted on the Oregon market, and none is expected for about a week yet, he believes.

Just what effect will be seen on the local market he would not predict. A week more will give time to see if the California prices will maintain the same level, when predictions on the Oregon market can safely be made. Forecasts at this time would be very uncertain, he believes.

If the differential between the Oregon prices and California prices is not too great, there may be a quickened demand for Oregon prunes, he believes.

Nothing has been happening in the local prune market for some time, Mr. Gile stated, and the market may be dull for some little time.

PAVING COMPLETED FROM GLENDALE TO HIGHWAY
