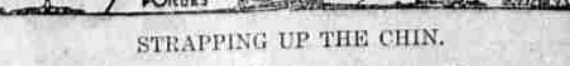
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BEAUTY CHATS

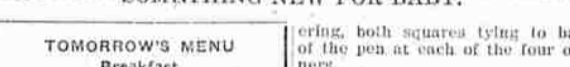

Children's Underclothes. There are five main general principles in choosing babies' and children's underclothes:

1. Smoothness of finish and texture of surface, to protect the skin against irritation; 2. Reasonable warmth; 3. Ability to absorb the perspiration; 4. Weave of such a nature so that the air is not excluded from the skin; 5. Ability to stand frequent washing.
