31 LOSSES FIGHT
WITH ILLNESS

lish by taking private lessons. Be-
tween his studies and odd jobs he
began frequenting cafes where he
took up dancing.He shifted from one job to an-
other, tackling landscape garden-
ing for a time in Central Park.
His quest for work found him do-
ing everything from sweeping out
stores to shining brass on auto
mobiles.The start of his career as a pro-
fessional dancer came when he
persuaded the head waiter of Max-
ine to give him a job as an en-
tertainer. His next engagements
were as a dancing partner, but he
discarded this in favor of traveling
with a musical comedy road show
from which he parted at Ogden,
Utah. Later at Oakland he became
a dancing instructor.800 Week First Screen Play.
Drifting to Los Angeles he met
Emmett J. Flynn, film director,
who gave him his first part in pic-
ture as a "heavy" at \$50 a week.After appearing in several pic-
tures he was selected by June
Mathis, scenario writer, for the
part of Julio in the "Four Horse-
men of the Apocalypse", a role
which started him on the road to
fame.In November, 1919, Valentino
married Jean Acker, screen actress,
by whom he was divorced in
January, 1922.The film career went on apace
and Valentino became a matinee
idol with his appearance in 1921
in "The Sheik" the first of a
series of desert romances.Domestic Life Stormy.
Before his divorce from JeanAcker became final Valentino mar-
ried Winifred de Wolfe Hudnut,
dancer and adopted daughter of the
cosmetics manufacturer, May 23,
1922, at Mexico, Mexico. He was
arrested and charged with bigamy
and released on bond. Later the
charge was dropped. The couple
were remarried March 15, 1923, at
Crown Point, Indiana. A rift ap-
peared early in 1925 in the mar-
riage of the "perfect lover of the
screen," when Mrs. Valentino de-
parted for New York to return to
the stage and the professional
name of Otta Rambova. It was
termed by the pair of a "trial
separation." Mrs. Valentino later
went to France, followed shortly
by her husband. She obtained a
Paris divorce last December. Val-
entino returned here to make "The
Son of the Sheik," his last picture.
His film career during his two
marriages was anything but smooth
sailing. Shortly after his divorce
from Jean Acker trouble arose with
Famous Players-Lasky, but he
made one more picture there, "The
Young Rajah." Then he broke his
contract with that organization.
There followed a two year absence
