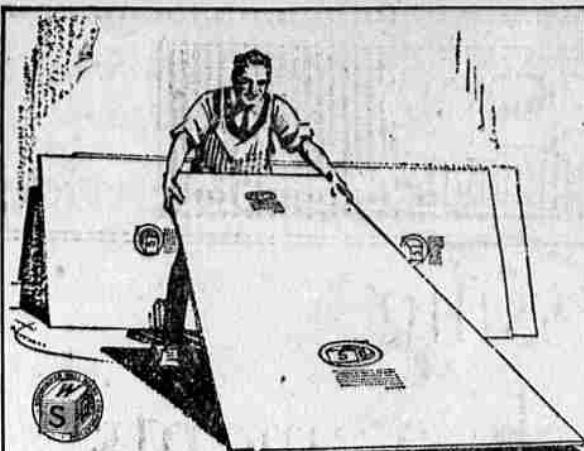

TRAFFIC BEING DETOURED ON ROAD SOUTH OF SUTHERLIN

Oiling operations are now in progress on the dirt stretches of the highway north of Roseburg. The state highway commission is placing fresh oil and fine crushed rock on the sections where overhead crossings are eventually to be constructed, the oiling being tried as an experiment for keeping the roads in better condition during the winter months and to eliminate dust during the summer. Watchmen are maintained at the sections being repaired to slow down traffic over the freshly oiled places. While improvements are being made at the long stretch just south of Sutherlin a detour is being forced over the old dirt road.

NEW ACREAGE IN COUNTY TO BE PUT UNDER IRRIGATION

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 24.—Applications to appropriate water yesterday filed in the state engineer's office as follows:
H. P. Smith, Roseburg, for 9.23 cubic feet per second from South Umpqua river, tributary of Umpqua river for irrigation of 19 acres. The pipe line and ditch to be 1,000 feet in length. Cost, \$700.
Ernest Vroman, Yoncalla, for 12 cubic feet per second from Bennett creek, tributary of Elk creek, for irrigation and domestic purposes. The main ditch to be 51 rods in length. A concrete dam and ditch dam and lumber headgate to be used; ten acres to be irrigated. Cost, \$150.
Jessie G. Hodges, Roseburg, for 35 cubic feet per second from Looking Glass and Flournoy creeks, tributary of South Umpqua river, for irrigation of 20 acres. Cost, \$900.

TEAMSTER FOUND ABUSING HORSES

Complaints that Pack Miller, a local teamster, engaged in hauling gravel from near the Oak street bridge, was abusing and mistreating his horses, today resulted in an investigation of the affair by Deputy Sheriff Shamrock. Miller was found to be trying to make a team of underfed horses pull a yard and a quarter of wet gravel up a fifteen per cent grade, using a blacksnake as a spur to the willing horses. Residents of the vicinity complained to the officers of the cruelty and abuse being practiced, and the deputy sheriff made a trip to the scene and watched the proceedings. The horses under their heavy load tried the hill three times, the weight each time halting them, and without sufficient breaks or blocks the load each time was backed to the foot of the grade. Although it had been the intention of the officer to watch the proceedings through, the cruel treatment could no longer be watched without criticism and the teamster was ordered, under threat of immediate arrest, to take off his load, which he proceeded to do. He was advised that any further attempts to force the team to handle such a load would cause arrest and prosecution for cruelty to animals.

MUST OPPOSE ALL RELIGIOUS LAWS

Advocating entire separation of church and state in the United States, and opposing any proposed changes in the constitution relative to religious affairs, H. G. Thurston, secretary of the Religious Liberty Association for the North Pacific Union Conference of Adventists, spoke at the tent pavilion in Hellows Park last evening. While many citizens might have an idea that there is no danger of blue law advocates winning the national congress to their way of thinking, Mr. Thurston stated that there were at present several bills pending that would doubtless come up for early consideration as soon as congress convenes this fall. Some of the measures already introduced, he made it plain, are so drastic that not even a daily paper may be published and sold on Sunday; gas stations will be closed, and the sponsors of these blue law bills hope to get the thing passed and the District of Columbia closed tight on Sundays. That much accomplished, the work of broadening the scope of the measure would speedily follow and the people of all the states eventually subjected to church domination through federal enactment.

SHEFFIELD BRINGS KELLOGG REPORT ON MEXICAN AFFAIRS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.—Mexico's present troubles, particularly her dispute with the United States over the new land and oil laws, were discussed today at a conference between Secretary Kellogg and Ambassador Sheffield just home from the Mexican capital. The ambassador's call here was made the occasion for a repetition of the oft-stated view of the Washington government that the religious issue in Mexico must be regarded as purely domestic to that country, calling for no diplomatic intervention from Washington. The only concern here is that the rights of American citizens be safeguarded. It was pointed out that the outstanding diplomatic issue under consideration at the conference was the land and oil controversy, for months a subject of official correspondence. A reply to the latest American note of protest is awaited as the next step in the exchange, but meantime Mr. Sheffield was able to give Secretary Kellogg an intimate picture of the probabilities of the situation and of the general attitude of Calles and his cabinet toward Washington. Department officials insisted that despite surface indications of a disagreement, the ambassador and the secretary were working in perfect harmony toward solution of the oil and land problem. Mr. Sheffield has indicated that he favors a strong stand for protection of American rights, but he had no public word of criticism to day for the conciliatory tone which has characterized the American notes delivered by him, on orders from Washington, to the Mexican foreign office.

STANFIELD SAYS SAND ISLAND U. S. DOMAIN

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 25.—Senator Robert N. Stanfield, Oregon Republican, chairman of the senate subcommittee on public lands, which spent Monday and Tuesday at Astoria and Ilwaco, Wash., investigating the Sand Island controversy said today, "I believe the committee was thoroughly convinced that the present sand island belongs to the federal government by virtue of transfer made by Oregon in 1864 to the federal government. Senator Stanfield has pending in the senate a bill ceding the island back to Oregon. Washington senators have opposed the bill, claiming that accretions had made the island part of the state of Washington."
